#### **UNDERGROUND RAILWAY** MAY EMPLOY 20,000 MEN FOR TWO YEARS

LONDON, Oct. 27 .- (Canadian Press Cable.)—The biggest single scheme yet suggested in connection with the Government's unemployment policy has been submitted to the Government by the Underground Railways Company, which proposes to raise £6,000,000 sterling to spend on developing and extend-ing the London tubes. It is claimed that in this undertaking employment could be given to 20,000 men for two years. The Underground Railways Company asks the Government to guarantee the interest on the sum proposed to be raised and grant the compan reasonable security" against competi-

#### tion for 10 years. **OUESTION OF LABRADOR** BOUNDARY TO COME UP

WINNIPEG, Oct. 27. - (Canadian ress Dispatch.)-Sir Patrick McGrath is at present in Winnipeg, having been commissioned by the Newfoundland Government to search into the records of the Hudson's Bay Company to find, if poss ble, facts bearing on the ques-tion of the Labrador boundary. This question is soon to come before the Privy Council in the nature of a suit the Crown Colony of Newfoundland. Sir Patrick has come to Winnipeg, he said, because since it has become the headquarters of the Hudson Bay Company it is assumed that records of great importance are filed there.
