MECHANIC KILLED IN RACE

BOULOGNE, August 31.—During the race yesterday for the automobile cup named in honor of Georges Bolloir, a French driver and ace in the French air forces, who was killed in the war in 1916, the steering gear of one of the cars broke and he crashed into a tree and took fire. The mechanic, Vauthier, was killed and the driver, Matthis, badly burned. The race took place on a 20-mile circuit over the country roads.

ARGUE OWNERSHIP OF DOCK RIGHT-OF-WAY DECISION MAY REVIVE STRIFE

FOUND DEAD NEAR SWAMP

James Lacroix, of Elora, Had Been Missing for Ten Days. ELORA, Aug. 30.—After he had been missing for ten days the lifeless body of James Lacroix was found last night by Hugh Preston at the side of a swamp on the latter's farm, about a mile from Elora. The place is secluded and seldom visited.

IRISH TROUBLE PREDICTED HERE

Forecast of Ulster M. P. Supported by Boundary Situation. Lavery, member for County Down in the Parliament of Ulster and second vice-president of the Orange Triennial Council of the World.

TWO DIE IN EXPLOSION ON BRITISH STEAMER

HAVRE, France, August 31.—A violent explosion occurred last night on board the small British steamer Concorde, moored in the port. The vessel broke in two and caught fire and sank. The French watchman and his wife, the only persons aboard, perished.

GREATER THAN EXPECTED

PROPOSE WORLD UNION OF LABOR

Central Control Empowered to Call World Strike. OTTAWA, Aug. 30.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—A world union, comprising all trade union organizations in the world, with a central control empowered to call a world strike and assess the workers of the entire world to finance it, is the aim of a resolution passed at a meeting of the Canadian Labor party, held here on Saturday and Sunday.
