THE GREAT LAKE BASINS OF THE ST. LAWRENCE.

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When recently considering the physical and geological relations of the Canadian flora, my attention was drawn to the many interesting questions connected with the formation of the St. Lawrence Great Lake Basins. What had been their history in past time?
