The Canadian Prime Minister, the Rt. Hon. John G.
Diefenbaker, had this to say in the House of Commons when the
Bill of Rights was given its third reading: "The principles
of freedom are never final. Freedom is not static. It cannot
be fixed for all time. It either grows or it dies. It grows
when the people of a country have it in their hearts and demand
that it shall be preserved. I would be the last to contend
that any document made by man, however impressive, can assure
freedom; but I think that what we have done will provide an
anchor for Canadian rights. The ultimate assurance of them
must always be a vigilant people, vigilant to invasions of and
intrusions on their freedom; when the spirit of freedom dies in
the hearts of men no statute can preserve it". It is considerations such as these, Mr. Chairman, which compel us to recognize
that ultimately the real effectiveness of the Covenants will
depend upon the spirit with which they are administered.
