JUVENILE DELINQUENTS ACT

AMENDMENTS RESPECTING CONFINEMENT OF JUVENILE OFFENDERS

Mr. Frank Howard (Skeena) moved for leave to introduce Bill No. C-133, to amend the Juvenile Delinquents Act.

He said: The Fauteux committee on judicial services recommended, among other things, that children or juveniles of the age of 16 years or less should not be confined in a penitentiary or other jail or lock-up where adults are also confined. This was brought forcibly to our attention when during a visit to St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary we met and spoke with a young lad of 15 years of age at that institution.

The purpose of this bill is to put into effect that particular recommendation of the Fauteux committee and, because the language of the act at the present time is not as precise as it could be, there are some changes proposed in the definition of "child" in order to make it clear that the purpose of the bill is to provide that no child of the age of 16 or under shall be confined in a penal institution where adults are also confined.

Motion agreed to and bill read the first time.
