## APPOINTMENT OF JOINT PARLIAMENTARY COMMITTEE

On the order: Government notices of motions:

December 15, 1969—The Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs:

That a special joint committee of the Senate and House of Commons to be known as the Joint Parliamentary Committee on Price Stability, be appointed to consider reports of the Prices and Incomes Commission, and such other related reports or papers as may be referred to the committee, with powers to report from time to time its observations and opinions thereon; to send for persons, papers and records; to sit during sittings and adjournments of the House; to print from day

to day such papers and evidence as may be ordered by the committee; and to delegate to subcommittees any of its powers except the power to report directly to the House of Commons.

That 12 members of the House of Commons, to be designated at a later date, act on behalf of the House as members of the said committee, seven of whom shall be required for a quorum.

That when a quorum is not present, the chairmen of the said committee or of its subcommittees be authorized to proceed with meetings for the purpose of receiving and printing evidence; and

That a message be sent to the Senate requesting that House to unite with this House for the above purpose, and to select, if the Senate deems advisable, some of its members to act on the proposed special joint committee.
