CANADIAN PARTICIPATION IN UNITED NATIONS VOTES Question No. 1,224—Mr. Cossitt:

1. (a) In how many votes has Canada participated at the United Nations since April 30, 1968 (b) how many times did it vote (i) in the affirmative (ii) in the negative (c) how many times did it abstain?

2. In the case of each abstention, what was (a) the specific question involved (b) the reason Canada abstained (c) the name and job designation of the highest authority in the government deciding upon such abstention?

Mr. Herb Breau (Parliamentary Secretary to Secretary of State for External Affairs): It would be a task of considerable magnitude to reply in full to the Hon. member's question. As he will be aware, there are literally

thousands of issues that have been dealt with by the various institutions, committees, organs and agencies of the United Nations system in the period in question. In the belief, however, that the main thrust of the question has to do with voting in Plenary meetings of the annual General Assembly, the focus of the response set out below is upon resolutions coming before that body for discussion and voting. 1. (a) Number of votes Canada has participated in since the April 30th, 1968 (excluding all resolutions etc., adopted without vote), 725; (b) (i) affirmative votes, 496; (ii) negative votes, 49; (iii) abstentions, 180.
