Dear Sir:

I have been requested by the executive of the Pharmaceutical Society of McGill, to reapproach you on the granting of a degree in the Dept. of Pharmacy. On June 31st, 1924. we received your notification, stating that you were about to take up the matter with Dean Martin, but as yet a reply has not been forthcoming.

As you are no doubt aware Sir, since the above mentioned date the course in Pharmacy has been extended, having a compulsory three year course, and a greater number of lectures.

Whilst on the subject I would like to point out, that the great majority of our students, besides having the usual High School Matriculation Requirements, pass the Board Examination of the Pharmaceutical Association of Quebec, before entering College.

Now Sir, the main object of this letter is to beg your indulgence in granting an interview to one of our representatives in order that he may explain our views and position in the matter. We feel that it is only by a personal interview that we can achieve results which will be satisfactory to all concerned.
