may appear fome too high to be entirely overlooked and neglected.

The principal Query is, Whether, at the enfuing Peace, it will be most advantageous to the Interest of Great-Britain to keep Canada, in Preference to Guadaloupe? To this I answer in the Affirmative; and in giving my Reasons for it, I shall fully consider your Arguments on the other Side of the Question, and shall endeavour, in a distinct, clear, and concise Manner, to point out the several Errors that have occurred to me, on an impartial and careful Review of your Pamphlet.

No one can be so weak as to imagine, that the French are sond of going to War merely for the Sake of sighting. No, it is the Ambition of enlarging their Territories, and of increasing their Dominions; and this, no Doubt, was the Occasion of the present War: France had, for a long Time, beheld with an envious Eye, the Increase of the British Settlements in North America, its Addition to the Strength of the British Naval Power, its Improvements in Commerce, and the Means of peopling a large and sertile Country with British Subjects. These were weighty Considerations with the French to begin a Rupture in that Part of the World.
