OBSERVATORY, TORONTO, Sept. 5.—(8 p.m.)—Light showers have occurred locally today in Alberta and Manitoba; elsewhere throughout Canada the weather has been very fine. It is decidedly warm in Manitoba and Saskatchewan, and comparatively cool from the great lakes eastward and in Alberta.

Probabilities—Lower Lakes and Georgian Bay—Moderate easterly winds; fine and a little warmer. Ottawa Valley and Upper St. Lawrence—Light to moderate winds; fine and a little warmer. Lower St. Lawrence, Gulf and Maritime—Light to moderate winds; fine; not much change in temperature. Lake Superior—Moderate to fresh east to south winds; generally fair, but a few scattered showers, chiefly tonight or on Sunday; stationary or higher temperatures.

Manitoba—A few local showers or thunderstorms but generally fair and warm. Saskatchewan—A few local showers, but mostly fair; becoming a little cooler. Alberta—Mostly fair and comparatively cool.
