LUCKY DRIVE WAS WHAT BEAT LEAFS

Pratt Gave Grays Chance to Go in Front—Cook Pitched in and Out Ball.

PROVIDENCE, May 7.—Bill Clymer's Maple Leafs gave the Grays a hard battle for the opening game of the series this afternoon and played good enough ball to win any game, but the tide was turned in the seventh when the way the game was going it looked a victory for the visitors, and a lucky drive for Pratt changed things in the twinkling of an eye and turned the game into a 4 to 2 victory for the locals.

Ralph Comstock, who joined the Grays at Toronto last summer, and was drafted by the Red Sox last fall, pitched his first game for the Grays since returning here and showed in splendid form. He had the Leafs' first five innings out and it was not until one man was out in the sixth that the first hit was called by the visitors, Kelly dropping a Texas League. Kelly was the victim of some hard luck in the seventh, when he looked as if the Leafs had shifted enough runs to win. Manager Clymer sent Cook to the firing line, and he pitched good and indifferent ball. He was hit hard in the first, third and seventh innings, but looked like a million dollars in the other sessions. He was given the finest kind of support by his field, the hired men in Toronto uniforms performing brilliantly in the field. Hollander's third base playing especially being as good as seen here this year. They fielded sharply and showed more life in the field than the Toronto team of last year ever attempted, and outscored the Grays in this respect. Both pitchers were taken out to let a man hit for him. O'Brien and Comstock finished strong. The day was dark and rain fell at intervals. With one gone in the first inning Shorten singled to right and went on to second base. Cook pitched to third on O'Brien's long fly to Brown. The Leafs made a great bid for the game in the seventh. Hollander opened with a safe bunt down the first base line. Graham bunted to O'Brien and nobody covered the base, both being safe. Hollander was caught of second, but won a dodging match by reaching third. Brown hit to left for two bases, scoring Hollander and placing Graham on third, whence he tallied on Sheehan's long wallop to Twitler.

In the Grays' half, after O'Hara had made a fine catch, Hiley fouled, Hiley tripled to right. Pratt hit for Comstock and dropped the ball an inch too far in for O'Hara to land, and Hiley tied the score. Fabrique singled to right, and both tallied when Shorten hit to left for two bases. Sheehan's drive was cleverly handled by Bosch and Shorten was nailed at third. O'Brien hit safely to right, and Brackett pitched a magnificent ball to Hollander and Sheehan was also nailed at third. 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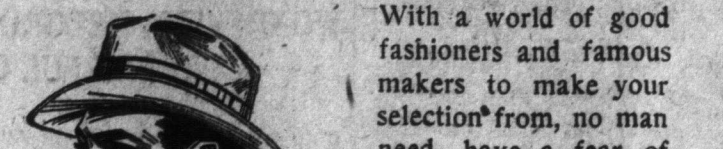

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A FILLY MAY WIN KENTUCKY DERBY

Fourteen Starters Expected to Face the Barrier Today at Louisville.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 7.—Fourteen starters, the cream of American thoroughbreds, as judged by their two-year-old form, probably will face the barrier at Churchill Downs tomorrow afternoon when the forty-first annual renewal of the Kentucky Derby will be run. The field is the largest in recent years. The race is over a mile and a quarter course, and is for three-year-olds. Its value approximately is \$15,000.

Nineteen horses have been officially entered.

All the probable starters have extensive followings, and, to judge by the trend of opinion, the race is a decidedly open one. For the first time since the inception of the race, in 1875, a filly is regarded by the most astute experts as the ranking favorite, and conceded the best chance to land the rich plum. The filly is Harry Payne Whitney's Regret.

The unbeaten daughter of Broomstick, Jersey Lightning, regarded last season as the champion of her age, is said to have carried her form along in great shape, and is regarded by veteran turfmen as being in superb condition. Her best trial was a mile and a quarter in 2:08 2-5, but whippersnappers of a trial in 2:04 4-5 before being shipped here are generally credited and have gained additional support for her.

Lieut. Gairdner Star Of Battalion Games

The 35th Battalion Canadian expeditionary force held a very successful field day yesterday afternoon at the Varsity Stadium. The threatening weather retarded the attendance, but nevertheless there was a highly enthusiastic crowd to watch the boys compete for athletic prizes.

The sports opened with pre-eminence, led by their own, the 35th Battalion, and the band of the 20th Battalion, who marched around the stadium and then going through a series of maneuvers, with precision, showing the high order of their training.
