

anything further. Not being financially very strong, they have to proceed with caution in their undertakings. At the same time, they desire to have an edifice worthy of Presbyterianism in Montreal; and as they have the honour of bearing all that was transferable of the name of the old church in St. Gabriel street, and are joint heirs, with many others, of the memories of that venerable edifice, they trust that they shall have the cordial sympathy and support of the other congregations, in their efforts to free it of debt, and to erect the tower. Their endeavour will be to carry on the work of Christ in the spirit of the best traditions of the St. Gabriel Street Church, and to strengthen the Presbyterian cause in the central part of the city. As the centenary has not otherwise been signalized by any permanent memorial, it has occurred to the authorities of the church to propose that the new tower should be called "The Centennial Tower," and that the members of the Presbyterian church generally should be asked to contribute to it. At all events, it is believed that many of the descendants of former worshippers in St. Gabriel Street Church, even though they may now belong to other communions, will be glad of an opportunity of joining in some such commemorative effort.
