ACTION OF THE FOUR NEGOTIATING CHURCHES,

There are four parties interested in he pending negotiations for Union: ur own Church and the Canada Presvterian, in the Provinces of Ontario nd Quebec, "the Presbyterian Church f the Lower Provinces of B. N. A.," nd "the Church of Scotland in Nova cotia, New Brunswick and adjoining Provinces" At the meeting of their espective Supreme Courts, held in 1870, ommittees were severally appointed to onsider the desirableness and practicaility of an organic Union of these ifferent members of the Presbyterian unily, From that time until now Comnittees on Union have been annually ppointed by each of the Churches and he great question itself has, during four lears, furnished the chief topic of disussion in the various Church Courts, he proceedings in this matter may now e said to have reached the final stage, t is, therefore, interesting and imporant in the highest degree to ascertain he mind of the parties concerned. We an only judge the mind of the great body f the people by the voice of their representatives, and it is to be remembered that all the Supreme Courts as well as the Presbyteries are composed of an equal number of laymen and clergymen.

[At its last meeting the Synod of the Kirk approved of the Basis of Union by a vote of eighty-eight to ten.]

If there was any vote taken in the assembly of the C. P. Church in regard to sending the revised Remit down to Presbyteries and Sessions, it has escaped our notice. In regard to the main question, the assembly was we believe all but unanimous, the only expressed dissent being in regard to the Resolution on "modes of worship," to which exception was taken by five Ministers and one Elder. Among the ministers were Rev. John McTavish and Rev. John Ross. The former, it is well known, has publicly stated that, although he has not got all he wanted in this Remit, his opposition to the Union is at an end.

It will be seen from the subjoined extracts that both the Churches in the Lower Provinces through their respective Synods have approved the Remit, and consequently the proposed Union, without a single dissentient voice.
