BOTH PARTIES BUSY CAMPAIGNING ONTARIO

Dominion Elections Delayed by Trouble in Preparing Lists for Unorganized Districts.

There is no abatement of activity in the rival political camps for either federal or provincial purposes. The Conservatives are still holding conventions and nominating candidates. The big Conservative event of the week in this neighborhood is the North Ontario picnic at Uxbridge to-morrow, when Major Sam Sharpe and his cohorts will hold forth.

Concurrent with Conservative activity, Hon. A. G. MacKay, for the Liberals, is preparing to carry his combined provincial-reciprocity campaign into Northern Ontario. His itinerary until the end of the month will include older portions of the province, and in many places he will speak in company with Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, culminating with a meeting at Sault Ste. Marie, on the afternoon of July 10, the Liberals for West Ontario will meet in Dominion convention, and held. Continuing demonstration will be held at Port Arthur, where the Liberal leader will speak July 12 and 13 in Port Arthur, where a provincial convention will be held, after which he will devote a couple of days to the Rainy River district. On the completion of this campaign, MacKay will probably spend a short time in the west.

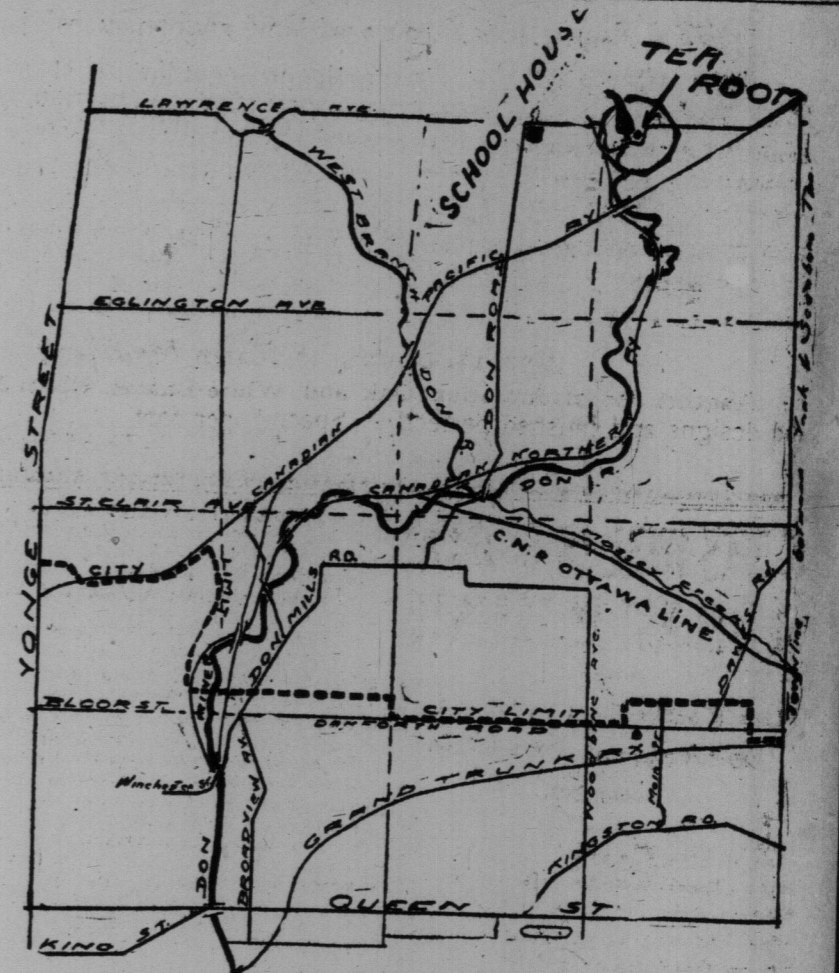
Metropolitan Racing Dates.
