CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—Big receipts which were rather pressed for sale. The gentine helped force down to-day the price of wheat. The close was heavy, 5-8c to 3-4c lower than Saturday night. Corn suffered a decline of 1-4c and 3-8 to 3-4c and oats a loss of 1-4c to 3-8c. The end of the day left hog products varying from 5c off to an advance of 2 1-2c.

Car lot arrivals of wheat at points

alone equal to those of a year ago at all of the western primary markets combined. Depression due to this fact received greater emphasis owing to the United States visible supply showing an increase that carried the amount available, nearly 70,000,000 bush.

Good Conditions in Argentine.

Traders found themselves confronted also with fine harvesting conditions in the Argentine, a disagreeable surprise to the builts, who had been hoping for more damage from rain and black rust. World shipments, too, were greatly in excess of the estimates. Nothing encouraging for higher prices developed, but, on the contrary, the hardest selling pressure of the day was felt just at the close, when a determined effort was made to force the May option under a dollar. During the session as a whole May ranged from 100 to 100 5-8, with the close 3-4 net lower at 100 to 100 1-8.

Corn and Oats Weak. Increasing consignments of corn acted as an offset for a for-cast of rain and snow. The weakness wheat, too, aided in turning the market to the bear side. May fluctuated between 64c and 64 5-8c, closing weak at 64c a net loss of 1-4c to 3-8c.

Oats were in poor demand, a few of the larger longs unloaded and brought about a weakness in the market. Top and bottom figures touched by May were 49 5-8c to 49 1-4c, with the close 1-4c off at 49 1-4c to 49 3-8c.

In the provision crowd the principal owners appeared satisfied to hold values reasonably steady to firm. The desire seemed to be to avoid a level that might provoke selling. Larger exports than a year ago were against the bear side. In the final trading the market, compared with 48 hours before, had not altered either way to exceed five cents.
