CRIPPLE CREEK IN ASHES.

Estimated at \$2,000,000.

Cripple Creek, Col., April 25.—The main portion of the business section of the city is in ashes to-night. Charred timbers and crumbling walls now mark the sites of what were the best business blocks of the town. One million dollars is considered by some to be a conservative estimate of the damage, while others place the loss as high as \$2,000,000. As nearly as can be estimated the insurance will not exceed \$250,000.


