

BURGLARIES LAID TO YOUTHFUL TRIO

Small Boys Said to Have Broken Into Office and Held Up Youngster on Street.

This morning Detective Nickle arrested three small boys, who reside in the east end of the city on serious charges of theft.

For some time past stealings have been reported from East London, and every time the blame has been placed on unknown small boys.

About two weeks ago the office of James & Connors, coal and wood dealers, was entered and \$30 in cash taken from the till.

Last Tuesday three small boys called at the same office and told the young lady in charge that a man in the yard wanted to see her. During her absence the boys robbed the till of \$5.50.

Only last Friday two boys in the east end held up Harry Secord, a newsboy, and took \$2 away from him.

It is alleged that the boys under arrest have committed all three of the robberies, and others not yet brought to light.

The trio will appear at the juvenile court tomorrow morning.

FIRE WAGONS COLLIDE

Same Together While Responding to an Alarm.

At about 11:30 this morning the firemen were called to the store of the London Floral Company, on Dundas street, near Wellington. It was only a chimney blaze, but the firemen did not know this and every piece of apparatus in the city turned out, as is the custom when an alarm is sent in from the business district.

While the men from the central station were investigating the cause of the alarm, two pieces of apparatus collided at the corner of King and Wellington street.

No. 2 company came west from the East London hall on King street, and No. 3 company came in from South London via York and Wellington streets. A blinding snow storm was raging at the time. The heavy combination chemical wagons were swinging from side to side on the pavements, and at the intersection of King and Wellington, the East London outfit struck No. 3's wagon, with the result that the latter sustained a broken wagon tongue. Men and horses escaped uninjured. Chief Clark had a duplicate tongue brought out and in a few minutes the wagon was able to proceed to No. 2 station.

She was a second-year girl in the general course of the Collegiate Institute, was bright and possessed a sunny disposition which made her many friends among the teachers and students. Previous to entering the Collegiate Institute here she had attended the school of section No. 13 Westminster. She is survived by her parents, four brothers and one sister, as follows: William, James, Alexander and Daniel, and Annie. She was the youngest child.

Principal Radcliffe of the Collegiate Institute was one of the first to arrive on the scene, and he looked after the other pupils, and in every way took a keen interest in his little school friends. He spoke feelingly of Eva Simpson, who had been in his school for two years.

WOULD TAKE VETO FROM THE LORDS

National Liberal Federation Asks Government to Have the Question Settled.

London, Nov. 27.—The intensity of the political feeling aroused by the treatment of the education bill in the House of Lords found expression today in an emergency meeting of the committee of the National Liberal Federation, at which a resolution was unanimously adopted urging the Government to reject the Lords' amendments to the bill and "resolutely to determine that the present Parliament shall not come to an end until steps are taken to bring a final agreement, the question whether the House of Peers should any longer possess the right to veto on the will of the people as declared by the House of Commons."

A letter from Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman was read, in which the Premier said that it was realized by all Liberals "that the House of Lords would hasten to assert itself as the instrument of unionism as soon as the country rendered a verdict against the Unionist Government and the Unionist policy."

Continuing, the latter said: "Still, I may plead guilty to a certain sense of surprise at the violence of the manifestation, now that it had come. The education bill as passed by the House of Commons was a bill which the country demanded in unmistakable terms at the general election. It now seems to have been turned into a travesty of its original form. As amended, it perpetuates, if it does not extend, the very grievances and wrongs fixed upon the country by the act of 1902. Of one thing you may rest assured. We will have no tampering with the main principles upon which our bill is founded. If within those limits an arrangement can be reached, all well and good. If not, it will be for us to see that on this question of education and on others a way is found by which the wishes of the country may be made to prevail."

Mr. Louis Allen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Allen, was on his way to Tobemorey to join a companion in a brief trapping outing, and his parents are prostrated over their loss.

An Unfortunate Craft

The Jones, as she was popularly designated, was well known all over the northern part of Lake Huron, including the Georgian Bay. She was of "tug" build, and was for many years engaged in collecting fresh fish, packed in boxes, from the various fishing stations—Tobemorey, The Ducks, Cockburn Island, Killarney, the Bustards, and points on the east coast of the Georgian Bay, completing her journey at Owen Sound. Of late years the franchise of these stations has been under the control of the Dominion Fish Company, and the boat was formerly owned by that organization. That she was staunchly built was proved conclusively when she was a few years ago sunk between Kagawong harbor and Clapperton Island as the result of a collision with the steamer Pacific of the Northern Navigation Company's fleet. She was floated and repaired the next spring and put on her old route, her first captain after the accident being the man who was first mate of the Pacific at the time of the collision.

Curiously enough the same season the Pacific was completely destroyed by fire at the owner's dock in Collingwood harbor.

The fate of the Jones, so similar to that of the Jane Miller a score of years ago, should be sufficient in the way of warning to deter any small vessel from venturing on the Georgian Bay during the season of bad fall storms. The Jones was a good vessel of her class, but was too small to weather the seas that have proved too much for larger vessels such as the ill-fated Asia. It is not necessary to suppose that she struck a rock; to all appearance she simply foundered as the result of being overwhelmed by waves too high to be overridden.

The Soos Cut Off.

Sault Ste. Marie, Nov. 28.—The Soos were without communication with the outside world for 30 hours up to last yesterday afternoon as a result of the terrific storm of Monday. Telegraph and telephone poles are down in all directions. It is reported 25 miles of poles are down on the Canadian Pacific Railway. The storm was the heaviest experienced here in many years. Trains were delayed and the river was filled with craft which dared not venture out into the gale and snow.

CITY WILL FIGHT FOR REDUCTION

Wants Cheaper Telephone Rates Than Prevail Under the Present Franchise.

This afternoon No. 1 committee of the city council meets Messrs. McFarland and Wilson, representatives of the Bell and Independent Telephone companies, respectively, in regard to a "phone franchise in London."

It is not expected that any more will be done today than to hear the offers of the rival concerns and the arguments relating thereto.

Mr. McFarland, by the way is an old London boy, and in civic circles he is regarded as one of the cleverest negotiators in Canada. He is general superintendent of the Bell Telephone Company of Canada, and his headquarters are in Montreal.

Secretary Wilson, of the Independent Company, is also said to be very shrewd. The aldermen intend to have City Solicitor Meredith present when any business with either of the "phone representatives is being conducted.

Mayor Judd is being criticised for allowing this matter to go along until a month before the date of the expiration of the contract before placing the city in communication with other companies that might want a franchise in London. If it had not been for Ald. Gilleen the matter would still be out of sight. It was he who brought the question to the front.

The city intends to put up a stiff fight for a reduction in "phone rates, and will produce the following table to show that other places are much better treated along this line than is London:

It will be seen from the above that while this city is well treated as a residence "phone compared with Windsor, St. Thomas and other places, it has a grievance as regards business "phones.

Desk "phones also cost \$3 extra, and the city fathers intend to bring this matter, as well as the charge of \$3 for long distance equipment, to the attention of the Bell people.

It is estimated that there are 2,300 "phones in the city, the list taking about 48 pages in the telephone directory. It is also said that since the last agreement with the Bell Company, over 500 new subscribers have been added in London.

UPPER HOUSE ADOPTS ADDRESS

Senators Scott and Coffey Refute Lougheed's Charge in Strong Speeches.

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—The debate on the address in the Senate closed yesterday afternoon, after addresses had been delivered by Hon. W. R. Scott, and Senators McCullen and Coffey. No one on the Opposition side offered to speak. It seemed as though the Conservative senators felt that Senator Lougheed, their leader, had gone beyond the limits of reasonable criticism on the previous day, and had displayed a partisanship which offended their sense of propriety and surprised even his friends. Hon. Mr. Scott's address, studiously courteous and dignified in style, was in marked contrast to that of Mr. Lougheed. It formed a most effective reply to the latter's statements.

Hon. Mr. Scott, after congratulating the mover and seconder, said he could not indorse much of what had been said by the leader of the opposition. He could not agree that Providence had not blessed Canada the prosperity that had come with Liberal Government. The Government had done something to help. During the eighteen Conservative years prior to 1896 the bank deposits had increased only at the rate of \$6,724,000 a year, and since that time the annual increase had been at the rate of \$34,000,000 a year, or six times as much as under the Conservatives. The aggregate trade had increased \$4,000,000 a year under the Conservatives, and at the rate of \$23,000,000 a year under the Liberals. The last year was as fertile and as sun as bright under the Conservatives as during the Liberal period, the Government must have had something to do with promoting the great increase of prosperity. Mr. Lougheed had hardly been fair in stating that the Liberals had promised free trade and had "acted protection, and that that new tariff would embody high tariff principles. The Government had never promised free trade. The Liberal party had, and still has, its aim in the direction of a lower tariff. Mr. Scott could go into the tariff, but he would be no longer of confidence to say that it would not be a high protective tariff. The last tariff had been a step toward lower duties, and the British preference was a considerably farther step.

Senator Lougheed's criticism of the London election, and his charge of electoral corruption against the Liberals was unfair. Most of the improvements in the election act had been made by the Liberals, most of them in 1874. Liberals had suffered more from corrupt practices in the elections than had the Conservatives, and Scott contended, as everyone must, that the irregularities that had been proved to have taken place in London. However, it had not been shown that Mr. Hyman knew anything about them. Mr. Hyman had a majority of over four hundred, and it had not been shown that a quarter that party would have been influenced by bribery. His election certainly had not to be bought. The Conservatives must have known that this money had been spent. Why had they not protested the election? The only conclusion was that they had been guilty of similar offenses.

Senator Coffey.

Senator Coffey spoke strongly of the Canada's present prosperity and of the great promise of prosperity for the future. The fame of Canada should be sacred to Canadians. It was regrettable that party feelings should produce statements which had little foundation in fact, but which worked to the injury of Canada. Senator Coffey refuted the charge of electoral corruption that had been carried on in Parliament last year without result. This was not the fault of the fishers, but that there was nothing to catch. A principle of business was that greater progress meant more expenditure. The present Government had recognized this in a way which had produced satisfactory results. They had acted well in their time. After all, capital and labor were not so very far apart. It was satisfactory to know that the insurance laws were likely to be strengthened. The London revelations had been unduly magnified. Conservatives had not the pure record in Ontario that Senator Lougheed intimated. For years that party had the able assistance of Conservative-appointed judges. The fairness of the present Government could be measured by the fact that they had not consigned to the Conservative side of the scale in London being opened. The wrongdoers in London were a small community. Mr. Hyman's name had not been connected with it. He hoped Mr. Hyman would again run and gain the election. The address was then adopted and the Senate adjourned.

New York Central was conspicuous strong, there being a good borrowing demand in the loan market. The rates varied from 4 per cent down to flat. Of gossip in regard to it there is little or none. St. Paul acted better than for some days in consequence of the circulation of old rumors of a closer alliance with Union Pacific, and it is now assured into this alliance. Illinois Central will enter. So all rates for money have not been as high as war feared. Loans have varied from 5 1/2 to 6 per cent, and at the latter figure the supply of bank money seems to be fairly liberal.
