IN REVENGE FOR BOMBARDMENT

West Coast Tribesmen Attack Cape Juby-MacLean No Longer With Raisuli. 1 1 452

Paris Aug. 9.—A message received here from Admiral Philibert off Casablanca Morocco, probably forwarded from his flagship by wireless telegraphy and stated at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, says: "Gen. Drued's camp outside Casablanca was attacked today by 5,000 to 6,000 horsemen, who wern vigorously beaten off."
