



Inasmuch as great local interest is being taken in the King's Plate to be run off at Toronto today, the opinions of the various Toronto scribes, as to the probable winner, should prove of interest. The Star says:

"On public form, Photographer, from the stable of Hon. Adam Beck, looks to be the best, but Mr. Seagram's Sea Wall has been steadily improving, and will be the dependence of the Waterloo scribes. Half a Crown is a good colt, too, and between them they may get away with the London Plate. The Seagram stable will likely be the betting choice."

The News: "In all probability the race for the King's Plate will be a very open event, and the honors will be hard fought for among a large field. It is expected that thirteen horses will face the barrier. Mr. Jos. E. Seagram will, as usual, have the largest number of candidates, with Sea Wall, Half a Crown and Supper Dance supporting the Waterloo colors. Of the three Sea Wall, from past work, has the call. Huroko, Assemblyman and Reine de Saxe will not start. Hon. Adam Beck's Photographer will be a sure starter, and will likely go to the post favorite."

The Telegram: "On the work done this spring there seems to be a strong impression made on the minds of King's Plate followers that Hon. Adam Beck's Photographer should win on all counts and win well. He has shown a much better trial than any of the others; has done it in better style; finishes as strong as he begins; always fighting for his head, game and with speed enough on any form shown to beat any of the other candidates. He was a bit rank early with a tendency to be erratic, but since young Kelly began to ride him he has become very tractable, and is now all business, and is in tip-top condition."

As is shown by the above items the Beck entry will probably be the favorite, with the Seagram entries a second choice.

Adam Henry, the Indian runner, who is being touted as a possible successful rival of the great Longboat, has ideas of his own on training. Recently after a trial spin of three miles he unhooked from his ankles a pair of shot-laden anklets, each weighing eight ounces.

The Britons will compete for the new international challenge cup offered by Edwin Sheela, of Boston. They will play at Boston, Newport, New York and Cincinnati.

Mile Race Arranged for the Youngsters—The Five-Mile Senior Event.

The announcement that the Y. M. C. A. will have a one-mile handicap race for the junior boys on May 24, in addition to the five-mile road race, is greeted with much enthusiasm by the youngsters, who are anxious to show what they can do in the running line. The course for the junior event will be from the Y. M. C. A. building up Wellington street to Victoria Park, twice around the park and return.

In the senior race the prize list will be as follows: 1, gold, silver medal; 2, Waterman Ideal Fountain Pen; 3, fancy vest or trousers, value \$3.50; 4, sporty goods, value \$1.50; 5, running shoes value \$1.25.

Special time prize, Solid silver medal to man covering course in best time, no matter what position at finish. Winner of time prize forfeits right to any other prize.

The handicapping committee will be made up of Messrs. Dale, Brent and Ruddy. In the junior event the boys will be handicapped according to age.

The conditions for the senior event are as follows: Race will start at 9 a. m. sharp from the front of the Y. M. C. A. building, and the course will be north on Wellington street, around barrel placed on center of river bridge (two and a half miles from starting place) and return by the same route, finishing in front of the building. Entry fee, 25 cents. All entries must be in by Thursday at 6 p. m.

Handicaps will be allotted by a committee composed of Messrs. Dale, Ruddy and Brent, none of whom will be competitors in the race. Handicaps will be announced and posted on the morning of the race.

Toronto, May 17. — Tom Longboat has been doing things today. In preparation for the five-mile race at Caledonia he ran this morning at record speed over the five-mile course of the West End Y. M. C. A. He did the distance on ordinary roads in 24:59 4-5, a wonderful showing for even a track performance.

Longboat continues to make good. This morning's performance was practically a new record, as the amateur record of Champion A. Shrubbs, 24:33 2-5, made in 1924, was not subject to the same handicap of unprepared roads.

Canadian subscribers to the American horse papers have been notified of an increase in price, in view of the recent abrogation of the postal convention between the two countries. The price is raised \$1 a year. Even if it were \$10, we should have to take the United States publications, for the simple reason that there is no Canadian paper that makes its appeal exclusively to the horse-owning or horse-racing public. There is a good opening for a Canadian horseman's paper, and it may be that the protection afforded by the increased postage will be the starting point of a publication worthy of the country and the horses owned here.

Down at the Montreal horse show the horsemen from Ontario had things pretty much their own way, even with the two strongest show stables in Ontario, for their numbers absent—Crow and Murray and Mr. J. J. Dixon. There was hardly anything worth winning that the Ontario exhibitors did not attempt. Hon. Adam Beck cleaned things up in great style, and Dr. Young and Hugh Wilson, of Toronto, were good winners. Although Montreal is the home of more millionaires than any three other cities in Canada, it is somewhat behind the times in one of the most popular amusements of wealth—fine horses. The next city after Toronto in this respect is Winnipeg, and in another decade the western city will be able to give horse shows that will compare with those of the capital of Ontario. At present the western taste in horses runs to speed.

By the time this is in print, the King's Plate will be only a few hours away. At the time of writing Hon. Mr. Beck's Photographer is the most promising of the probable starters. The London horseman is at a disadvantage as compared with his great rival, Mr. Seagram, who can start three or four horses—one to even the race and two or three to help him do it, and pick up second money if possible. It is customary to refer to a victory of the Waterloo distiller as a "popular win," but as a matter of fact the popularity is confined to the people who have bet on his horses. As they are usually the favorite this number is large. Apart from the betting con-

RAN A DEAD HEAT AND DIVIDED PURSE

New York, May 17.—The second dead heat of the season was run at Belmont Park today. Tony Bonero and Shenandoah were the horses. The respective trainers decided against the race being run off and they split the purse.

It was nip and tuck between the two horses most of the mile and a sixteenth, but when the stretch was reached, Tony Bonero had a slight advantage. Musgrove, on Shenandoah, here began to ride hard, and gradually cut down Dugan's lead. Fifty yards from the wire he came on even terms with him. Homer Davenport, the famous American cartoonist, is an enthusiast on the subject of Arab horses. Despite the contempt with which they are regarded by Anglo-Saxon horsemen, he has some of the greatest expense of time and money to travel to import a number to the United States. His idea is that they are the right sort for getting saddle horses from ordinary mares. They have speed, beauty, endurance, and a superior order of intelligence, according to Mr. Davenport, but as far as the speed and endurance go, it is a question if the best of them is as good as a third-class thoroughbred. Any rate, whenever the eastern horse and the western thoroughbred have met, the Arabian has been simply out-classed. The cartoonist insists that the reason for the poor showing of the Arabians in these contests is that that he has them he is anxious to try for the 100-mile record of 8 hours 55 minutes, made by the trotter Conqueror in 1886. If his horse succeeds Mr. Davenport will have shown, according to Raymond, in the Horse world of Buffalo, that an Arabian of today can beat a trotter of fifty years ago. If Mr. Davenport wants to compete with contemporary trotters, he will have to get into the best two-in-three or three-in-five heat business.

Monroe Salisbury, the noted trotting horseman, surmises that the King-maker, on account of his remarkable success in producing champions, is dead. Although his racing record was flawless, he was not a popular man on the turf, primarily because of a gruff and forbidding manner. He will be remembered chiefly as the man who made the Director famous. He brought out Direct, Directum and Directly, and made each a world's champion in a day. He also trained Azote and Alla. Including Director himself, the champion stallion of his day. Here are six horses that owed their supremacy to him.
