Registration.

Important Information That All Citizens of Lon-
don Should Be Cognizant of.

The registrars appointed to perfect the voters' lists, upon which
the polling will take place for the Provincial elections on March 1, will
begin their duties on Friday next, Feb. 4, at 9 a.m. The registrars will
sit from that hour until 10 p.m., with interruptions from 1 to 2 p.m.,
and from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Any man, 21 years of age, will be entitled to vote on "going
personally before the registrars of his ward, and declaring—

1. That he is a British subject.
2. That he is 21 years of age.
3. That he has lived in London three months.
4. That he has lived in Ontario twelve months.

Persons who own or tenant premises in the city may not be on the
lists now made up. They may have been left off accidentally by the
civil officials, or they may have come to the city since the lists were
finally revised.

All such persons are, however, entitled to vote if they declare be-
fore the registrars, as above.

The safest course, indeed, for any citizen, who did not vote in the
recent municipal elections, is to see the voters' lists at the Liberal
rooms, Oddfellows' block, and ascertain if his name is on the list be-
fore the day of registration. If not, he must attend, and get it put on.

It is an easy, simple law to secure a full vote of the entire elector-
ate, and all should aid in perfecting it.

The Eastern Situation

Unconfirmed Report of an Agree-
ment Between Russia
and China.

Ten Thousand Russians To Be Sent At
Once to the Far East.

London, Jan. 31.—A dispatch to the
Daily Mail from Shanghai says that
secret dispatch has been issued by the
Tsung Li Yamen to certain high offi-
cials, informing them that Russia
warned China that if Kiao Chao were
to be handed over to Germany, Russia
would be obliged to take action. The
dispatch, according to the same dis-
patch, it is asserted at Shanghai that
China consents to Russian claims at
the head of her customs and railways.
At the present moment, says the
Daily Mail, the Chinese government
has been brought to the point of
surrender. Russian agents have been
sent to Tien Tsin, the port of
Peking, and to Japan to purchase coal
and food, and 60,000 bags of wheat
have been bought at Tien Tsin.
The Daily Mail this morning says it
learns from a source "worthy of ac-
curacy" that China is inclined to make
the best possible bargain with Russia,
whose diplomacy appears to have tri-
umphed at Peking, England having re-
solved not to force a conflict by fur-
ther opposing Russia's claims at Port
Arthur and in the Liao Tung penin-
sula. Japan, says the Daily Mail, has
authority, has been thrown into a
state of confusion by the British
back-down, and has adopted a more
friendly attitude toward Russia. This
friendly attitude, however, the Daily Mail
admits, "is incredible, and probably a
bluff, with a view of forcing England
to the decided steps." The Daily Mail
counsels its readers not to be alarmed.
The Berliner Tageblatt says it learns
of an agreement whereby England has
consented to drop her demand for the
opening of Ta Lien Wan as a free
port, and Russia waives further oppo-
sition to British control of the Chinese
sea customs.

Newspaper comment in Berlin is all
to the text of "England's inglorious
retreat," as indicated by the announce-
ment of the Berliner Tageblatt.

The North German Gazette publishes
a foreign office announcement that all
applications to open new business
at Kiao Chao are put off or open busi-
ness regarding the new sphere being
incomplete.

The National Gazette learns that
Turkey has given Russia permission to
send a black sea fleet through the
Dardanelles.

CABLE NOTES.
