The program included, in addition to the address by Mr. Bingham, one by an "original first" man, Lieut. Col. Emsley, who, in the capacity of chaplain, left Valcartier for overseas in September, 1914, with the gallant 33,000 Canadians who expected to drive the kaiser back to his own country and finish the war by Christmas.
