CABINET CONSIDERS LABOR TROUBLES. Ottawa, May 27 .- The industrial situation in the west was under consideration at a meeting of the Cabinet council this morning, which lasted from 11 o'clock till practically 1:30. There were fifteen members of the Government present, Sir Robert Borden

Reports submitted showed that a number of the postal employees in Winnipeg have returned to work. All is quiet there, according to information received by Major-Gen. Mewburn, minister of militia. The 27th Battalion, C. E. F., has arrived in Winnipeg and been demobilized. So far, there is no indication of seri-

Vancouver, B. C., May 27.—The general strike, in progress more than a week in Winnipeg, spreading during the last 24 hours to Calgary and Edmonton, Regina and several small districts, seemed today about to sweep into British Columbia. Last night it was announced from Victoria that the trades council had deeided to call for a strike vote in sympathy with Winnipeg strikers, the results to be in by Sunday night. In Vancouver the strike movement has been initiated by labor leaders, who said, however, they view with apprehension what might occur should it be found necessary to call upon the militia in the strike-affected areas. Several unions here, it was said, have strike votes in preparation for a week, but no results have been made public. Acting President McConnechy of the Postal Workers' Union declared the Vancouver union did not purpose to take any radical action without deliberate

consideration. In Edmonton, the general strike was but partially effective Monday. Sixteen hundred votes favored the Edmonton strike, eaders announced, and 500 opposed.

Frank A. Vanderlip Declares That United States Must Loan Money To Overseas Countries If Industrial Unrest and Bolshevism A re To Be Overcome.

New York, May 27.—Extension to every European country of credit sufficient to permit immediate resumption of industry was urged by Frank A. Vanderlip, president tof the National City Bank. in an address last night, at a dinner tendered him by the Economic club. Such a policy, he asserted, was the only safe course for America to pursue, in view of the threatened disorganization in Europe. Toronto, May 27 .- The question of the general strike in Toconto seems this afternoon to hinge on the granting of a 44-hour DOES NOT SIGN week at present rates of pay, to the striking workers of the metal trades. Employers have offered to grant a 48-hour week. Mayor Church and Sir William Hearst, premier of Ontario, are making every effort today to gring about an agreement between the metal workers and their employers and prevent further steps being taken toward the general strike threatened for 10 a.m. tomorrow

According to latest reports the vote for a general strike embraces forty-four unions, with a membership of 11,000 men. The membership of the 27 unions voting against the proposal, or not yet committed on the matter, is said to be 12,000.

Mayor Church has wired to Sir Robert Borden, asking if the Ottawa Government is considering legislation for the whole of Canada, on this question of the hours of labor, as a national policy. The mayor asks that prompt action be taken to relieve the crisis in Toronto.

Ponta Delgada, May 27.—The seaplane sent a wireless message to Admiral Jackson after starting, which read: "We seem to be on our way. Many thanks for your hospitality."
