"Fighting Parson" Says Granting of \$2,000 Gratuity is Necessary To Restore Morale of Veterans

Says Canada Can Afford To Meet This Demand—Dr. Stevenson Promises To Use His Influence To Get the Gratuity.

Speaking to an audience of a thousand returned soldiers at the Patricia Theatre on Sunday evening, Capt. J. P. Tupper, "The Fighting Parson" of Toronto, stated that as soon as the Government gave to the ex-soldiers the \$2,000 gratuity then would the men recover their morale, and be satisfied that Canada had kept its word to them. Several days before war was declared the padre had offered his services to the country, and he was glad that it was to place him. He was under no obligation to do so, but he was glad to do so. As a great many of them were still in France, "Thus he thought it was his duty to appear on a public platform and fight to carry out their last wishes, namely, to see that their dependants were cared for by the Government. Gadsby, a clever writer at Ottawa, had written an article arguing against the advisability of granting the increased gratuity. He had said that Canada was treating her returned men better than any other country, even better than the United States, which was a richer nation than the Dominion. Capt. Tupper declared that as Canadians did not wait to see what the United States would do before entering the war, the country should not wait to see what the United States would do before entering the war. The speaker believed that it would pay Canada as a country to grant the gratuity asked. There were many problems, inter-provincial and others, to be solved, and to them should not be added the returned-soldier problem.

\$1,079,992 in Savings.
One argument put out by those who were against giving the money was that the country could not afford the \$2,000. It would take \$800,000,000 to pay all. Capt. Tupper remarked that over a year \$200,000,000 was spent in the United States on luxuries, Canada was prosperous. The people had over-subscribed a \$200,000,000 loan by \$400,000,000. On May 21, 1914, there was \$800,000,000 in savings in the banks. Within five years of that date this sum had increased to \$1,079,992,992. This was in addition to autos and other devices which had been purchased. Dr. H. A. Stevenson informed those present that he would exercise whatever power he had to assist the men to get their gratuity. The Government at Toronto seemed to be disposed favorably toward giving the men their desire, if it was within their powers. There were many children who would not reap the benefit that their fathers would have secured for them because their parents were lying beneath the battlefields. These dependants should get the money that was due them. The A. D. nurses should not be forgotten either. Dr. Stevenson's brevity in dealing with the matter was due to the fact that he had recovered from influenza.

Civic Committee Approves \$434,000 Debenture Issue for Collegiate in South London

T. and L. Representatives To Have Access To Civic Contractors' Time-Sheets—Estimates Considered For Utilities, Market and City Relief.

Issue of \$434,000 in debentures for a South London collegiate and public schools was recommended by No. 1 committee of the city council at a special meeting held last night. A deputation from the board of education had explained the need of new buildings. Add. E. W. Walker, who was in the chair, stated that the board would accept the responsibility of submitting the proposition to the people.

A deputation from the Trades and Labor Council asked that union wages be paid on all city contracts and that the city council should have inspection by a member of the city council and a duly appointed representative of the city council. They claimed that the past contractors, although receiving the union rate of pay under their contract, were not paying this to their men.

The committee pointed out that already a fair-wage clause was inserted in every city contract, but agreed to add to this provision that the contractor must supply the city engineer with timesheets each week. The president of the Trades and Labor Council, on making application to the engineer, would be able to see these. If any private citizens desired the information he could obtain it through any of the aldermen.

Ald. Cameron Wilson thought the records should be available to any citizen at any time. The other aldermen, however, thought this might lead to much wasted time, as a few cranks might be continually bothering the department. They pointed out that it was only necessary to ask for the information through an alderman and it could be obtained.

Tenders on Town Hall.
On motion of Mayor Little, it was decided to call for tenders on the east end town hall. It is estimated that the cost of the new hall will be \$1,000,000. The mayor did not think the expenditure was justified.

Estimates of the city's publicity department were presented by Gordon Phillips. The industrial bureau will require \$1,500, 500 for traveling expenses, \$250 for printing and advertising and \$400 for incidents. City Clerk Baker requested for recorders during the year as well.

Keep of the comfort station will require \$700. An additional comfort station is built in East London the upkeep of this will be \$1,000. Market stalls will require \$975 for upkeep. No effort will be done on the market this year. A number of trucks will be provided. These two eliminations will save \$2,535. Street lighting will cost \$23,180. An addition of 20 lights at \$10 each was made.

City relief work will cost \$24,160. This included \$1,000 for the Queen Alexandra Sanatorium, \$500 to St. Joseph's Hospital, \$5,000 to the People's Home, \$4,200 to the Aged Men's Home, \$1,500 to the Home for Incurables, \$1,000 to the Children's Shelter and similar institutions total \$4,800.

It is estimated that \$7,425 will be obtained from license fees on theatres, bowling alleys and similar places.
