James R. anzies, M.D., D.D., a Presbyterian issionary from Toronto, is reported to have been killed by robbers at Swait-ingseu, province of Szechwan, China, according to cabled advices received, here yesterday. No direct word of the tragedy has been received by Presby-terian missionary headquarters here, and there is a growing hope that some mistake has been made and that Dr. mistake has been made, and that Menzies is still safe and sound. He was stationed at Hwalching Fu, in North Honan, which is upwards of 1,000 miles distant from the scene of the reported murder.

Dr. Menzies' wife and family reside at 32 Hampton avenue, Toronto. Until two years ago, Mrs. Menzies was in Honan with her husband. When her health broke down she came back to Toronto.

Born in Ailsa Craig.

James R. Menzies was born in Ailsa Craig, Ontario, and was a brother of Rev. George Menzies, M.D., who died at Mhow, Central India, in 1903. In 1895 he was graduated in medicine from Trinity University and in theology from Knox College. Almost immediately after graduation Almost immediately after graduation he left with his bride for Honan, China, as a medical missionary, and has been there practically ever since. Dr. Menzies was the builder and architect of a flourishing mission, and was in China throughout the Boxer troubles.

He was sent out by Bloor Street Presbyterian Church, and throughout his long years of service has been supported by the Bloor Street congregation. 
Therefore there are special considerations which we urge a party-line user to keep in mind:

1. Long conversations prevent the use of the line by the other subscriber; therefore, party-line talks should be as brief as possible.

2. Whenever another party-line subscriber requests the use of the line for an emergency, courtesy should prompt the first user temcorarily to give up the use of the line. 3. Whenever a party-line subscriber takes the

use, the receiver should be replaced at once in a careful manner. 4. At the end of a conversation the receiver should be replaced upon the hook immediately; otherwise the other subscriber cannot
