DELAWARE, Ohio, April 23.—The Canadians had their first real workout this evening, when they organized against the Ohio Wesleyan University outfit. He showed some great form, and is predicted by the local fans as a headliner on the London staff. Neitske was the hard-hitting veteran, claiming two home runs, knocking the pill outside the park on both occasions. Right Fielder Kennedy was no slouch with the stick. He slammed into the youngsters' plate splitters and helped to stack seventeen runs. The game was slow and demonstrated the lack of practice on both sides.

Manager Wetzel used three pitchers, giving each two or three rounds. Tomorrow the Londoners are to stage an exhibition game with the Varsity, and Wetzel expects to use Thomas and Wheeler on the mound, with Berger and Lamson on the receiving end. The clash has stirred up a great deal of interest among the local fans, and a good game is predicted.

Simulo Vigor was the entertainment of the afternoon. His smile never ceased, although he allowed several hits to bunch their hits and get two runs. Winding up his short left arm, he would slam away and wait for the umpire's decision. OLYMPIC HOCKEY
STARTS TODAY

ANTWERP, April 22.—Drawings for opponents in the hockey matches, the first competition in the Olympic games of 1920, will be made here this afternoon, and the teams will meet in the initial games tomorrow night. Seven teams, each representing a separate nation, are entered, with the Canadian and United States seven favorites for places in the final rounds.

All seven teams will play on a knock-out system, in which the two survivors will meet for the championship on Monday night. The defeated team in this match will be accorded second place. The five teams eliminated before the final match will then play a second elimination series, the winner to be awarded third place honors.

The Canadian and American teams indulged in hard practice sessions at the Ice Palace here yesterday afternoon and left off in fine physical condition.

These will be the final hard work-out before the games, unless the Canadians or United States players should draw a bye in the opening round.

FOR THE SUMMERFirst Annual Meeting Shows
Excellent Record in All
Sports.

GALT, April 22.—First annual meeting of the Galt Amateur Athletic Association was held this evening in the city hall with a very large attendance. One of the most important decisions of the evening was an unanimous vote for daylight saving, which was felt necessary in order to successfully operate the city baseball and football leagues.
