LONDON BILL KILLED ON THIRD READING BY VOTE OF 48 TO 44

Dramatic Finish To Up and Down Journey of City Measure
Providing For Bridge, Sewers, Railway Equipment —
Stevenson Was Sole Opponent At Second Reading.

TORONTO, May 20.—London City bill containing items concerning a new bridge over the Thames, a large expenditure for storm sewers, and another large expenditure for electrical railway equipment, was thrown out by the Legislature today by a majority of 48 to 44. Most of the members turned a complete somersault in their attitude. On the second reading a few days ago Dr. Stevenson, the member for London, was the lone opponent of the bill. He has consistently and persistently fought it since introduction, especially the three clauses mentioned above.

The committee, however, reported the bill to the House. It passed second reading with the London member alone opposed to it. It would have had third reading only Dr. Stevenson declined to move the third reading. Hon. W. F. Raney, as chairman of the committee which dealt with the bill and reported it to the House, would not move the third reading. Today, as soon as the order was mentioned J. A. Calder (North Oxford) immediately moved the third reading.

Pressed Amendment. Dr. Stevenson immediately pressed his amendment from the previous appearance of the bill in the House that

it be given a six-months' hoist. There was some doubt about the procedure, but the amendment was ruled in order. The vote took place on the third reading.

ing and to the surprise of the House practically every Farmer member voted with the London member against the bill. Three Liberals, Dr. McAlpine (Brockville), Dr. Racine (Russell), and N. Amussen (North Oxford), voted with the Farmer-Labor groups. The men on the Government side voting for the bill to pass were, Hon. D. C. Michael, Hon. Mr. Nixon and J. M. Webster (Langton), D. Denves (Hastings), and Johnston (Lanark).

Premier Drury and the members of his cabinet, except those mentioned, voted for the rejection of the bill. J. G. Lethbridge (Middlesex) quoted The London Advertiser in one of its editorials, and said that a great principle was involved as to whether the Legislature should sanction something that had been voted down by the people. He voted, however, for the act to be passed.

Some Farmer members evidently thought that for the bill to be defeated was a want of confidence in the Government. However, in any event, London does not get even farther than sanctioned. Up until today there had not seemed to be any opposition apart from the London member himself. The three Liberal members voting for the rejection of the bill did so because they did not think the thing right when the city decided the measure when submitted to the people.

MORNING SESSION.

TORONTO, May 20.—Premier Drury announced today that there will be a morning session of the Legislature tomorrow. Many members, it is understood, desire to visit their homes for the week-end by the afternoon train. The expectation is to finish the session by the end of the week.

will presumably have a well-stocked cellar—for supplies, but otherwise it looks as if the job might go to a prohibitionist with a little black mousetrap and a far-away look in his eyes. Mr. Rowell had his future read in the tea-cup not long ago and the best of good luck was predicted for him.

The Washington job is variously viewed by the members of Parliament. Quebec, of course, is pleased. Canada-as-a-nation does not daunt the hearty nationalists from that province. Canada-as-a-nation within the British Empire, Canada-as-a-nation "on her own" some surmises that Quebec has a heart for either fate so long as Quebec's privilege are fully guaranteed. Certain western members, whose names need not be mentioned here look even farther along the road in which independence is only the half-way house. Whatever their views they are pleased at this first installment of Canada's nationhood even if it has a long string to it. It is much more convenient to take things to a British ambassador who is just round the corner than to wait for the return mail from Downing street.

Who Will Get the Job? However, these are minor details. The main question is, Who is to get the job at Washington? Mr. Rowell has denied the soft impeachment, but there

is reason to believe that he would not refuse it if the thing was made unanimous. The cold blue eye, Mr. Rowell probably feels that Washington would be a good place to spend the crash comes even if the job does last only two years. Of course, a change of Government means a change of ministers at Washington, but by 1922 Mr. Rowell will have made such a name for himself that posterity will be quite satisfied to have him go back to his law practice in Toronto. Mr. Rowell has been studying the job up for the last three years, and could take a hundred marks on any paper on ambassadorship that the civil service commission might set. League of Nations, British North America act, Declaration of Independence, Brotherhoods of Man—Mr. Rowell has it all at his finger ends. Moreover, he has been working at it—working at it from all ends, Ottawa, Washington, London. If Premier Borden goes by the news called him from Ottawa by Mr. Rowell's various news services he will understand that there is only one great man in Canada and that his name is Rowell. If merit, industry and advertising can do the trick, the job is Mr. Rowell's without further parole.

Comes a doubt, however—a chilling doubt. Would Premier Borden like it? He has the edge on everybody else when it comes to handing the honors out. He is the source of blessing. Suppose he should choose to honor himself. Aye, there's the rub? If he likes the job at Washington all he has to do is to reach for it. Sir Robert may not be the expert on international relations that Mr. Rowell is, but he has the kind of knowledge a diplomat needs, the knowledge of polite society, golf courses and country clubs, which is caviare to Mr. Rowell.

Known Pleasure Resorts. Sir Robert has an intimate acquaintance with all the pleasure resorts along the Atlantic seaboard—and that is enough, generally of the United States for any Canadian minister to begin with. He can learn the rest as he goes along. Besides Sir Robert is our greatest cosmopolitan—our chiefest citizen of the world, at home in every

country but his own. Yes, Sir Robert can have the job if he wants it. Will he be magnanimous and make way for a faithful servant who has been muzzling the job up ever since he got a good look at it? All these doubts and more were on Mr. Rowell's face as he listened to Sir George Foster reading the fateful announcement in the great hall to set his silver cup or not? As Dr. Munyon says, there is hope, and on hope Mr. Rowell must live till Premier Borden makes up his mind.

A strong point for Mr. Rowell is that if he drops out of the cabinet he need not be replaced. The presidency of the council under ordinary circum-

stances carries no salary with it and is usually attached to the premiership. As Mr. Rowell has no regular portfolio his disappearance from the cabinet would not entail the appointment of another cabinet minister and a dangerous by-election.

Besides, Premier Borden may be looking to London rather than to Washington as a suitable spot for his dignity. There is a place on the imperial council which Sir Robert would fill with satisfaction to everybody, not to mention a Canadian law-lordship on the judicial committee of the imperial privy council which has long zone a-beeing. The high commissionership is another

plum that hangs from the tree, and tree being guarded meanwhile by Sir George Foster, both of whom have a taste for plums.
