Englishman Takes Count Twice in First Round—Jem Roche at the Ringside.

LONDON, Feb. 10.—Tommy Burns, the Canadian pugilist, to-night knocked out Jack Palmer of Newcastle, the English champion, in the fourth round of what was scheduled to be a 20-round contest for the heavyweight championship. Some two thousand persons saw the fight, which took place at the Ringside on two two pulses in the Canadian's face, but after each incursion he hunged Burns like a long-lost brother and permitted himself to fall in a mass at his feet. Under the circumstances the press criticism is most sarcastic. The Mail says: "As far as could be seen the amount of punishment Burns in flicted would possibly have made a baby cry. Palmer can claim to have received a record knockout, as nobody hear it. If Burns is to be judged by this display, he is the most humane boxer the world ever produced."
