## Darcy is a Spectator When Miske Wins Bout

Conditions Closely Watched by Australian Champion at Brooklyn.

New York, Jan. 1.—Joe Darcy, the Australian middleweight champion, witnessed his first ring contest in America in Brooklyn today. He sat in a ring-side box keeping close watch while Billy Miske of St. Paul and George (Knock-out) Brown of Chicago went through rounds of hard fighting during which the St. Paul man gave the Chicagoan a beating in eight of the ten rounds. Miske, who is prominently mentioned as an opponent for Darcy in the near future, had the advantage of height, reach and five pounds in weight, but Brown withstood terrific punishment after the first two rounds, which he had won, and was still fighting gamely when the finishing gong rang.

In the sixth round Miske landed a right swinging uppercut under Brown's jaw, but the Chicago man, clinched and stalled out the round, although groggy. In the following round he took three short arm jabs in the same place, besides some hard blows on the body, but Miske could not get his right over for a knockout. The arrangements here are rather strange to me," said Darcy, "you see both smoking and coaching from the corners are absolutely prohibited in Australia, but both are allowed here, and the men in the ring must be weakened by inhaling such a smoky atmosphere."

In another Brooklyn club today Harry Levinsky cleverly outpointed Gunboat Smith in a 10-round bout. Levinsky weighed 140½ pounds and Smith 132½. Mike O'Leary, the St. Paul lightweight, scored a decisive win over Johnny (Kid) Edwards, N.J., in nine out of ten rounds. Their respective weights were 154 and 155 pounds.

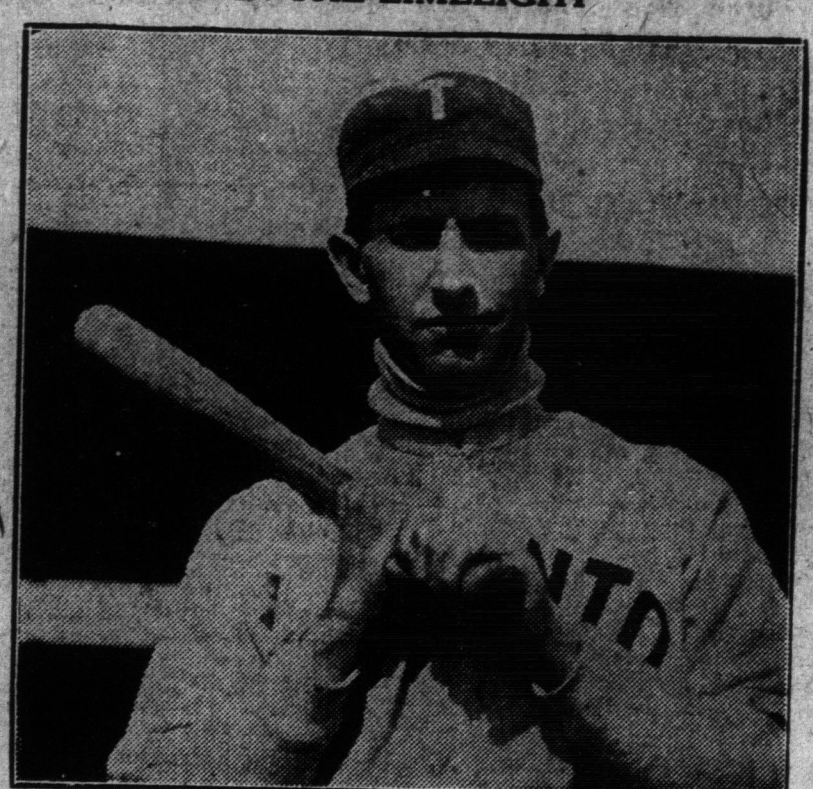
