



SHIPPING MEN CANNOT PAY ANY HIGHER WAGES TO THE LONGSHOREMEN


Indications point to a war between the steamship representatives and the Longshoremen's Association over the new schedule of rates, which was adopted by the association at last night's meeting.

THIS IS GEORGE. B. BARKER'S RECORD AS A FIREMAN

And Was Never Severely Injured at Any of the Many Fires He Has Helped to Extinguish -- First Served Under Chief Engineer Thomas Marter.



GEORGE B. BARKER, lieutenant, first time serving three years in that capacity, being appointed again last November.

"Well, this is the 29th time I have drawn pay," remarked Lieut. Geo. B. Barker, of No. 1 Hook and Ladder Company, who joined that Mr. Barker has been a fire fighter continuously since 1876, when he was appointed a "runner" (or as they are called now, substitute) by the late Thomas Marter, who was chief engineer at that time.
