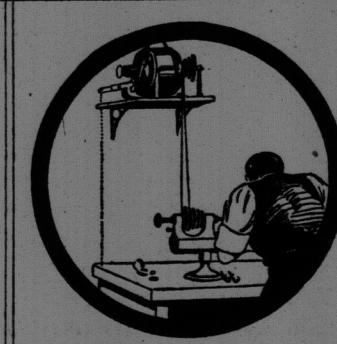

PERSONAL AND SOCIAL NEWS OF THE WEEK IN ST. JOHN

To the younger generation in St. John this week, the public school closings were of paramount importance. Especially this is true of the graduates who, having bade adieu to their school days, closed the door on the past and started forth with undaunted spirits to begin the perilous journey of life. That the solemnity of the occasion appealed to the valedictorians was evident in the tones of their voices as they read their carefully composed essays, before delighted audiences composed of the parents of the students, city officials (among whom was his worship the mayor) and dignitaries of the church. As the hours at which the exercises were held varied, the visitors were able to be present both at St. Vincent's Convent and at the High School sometime during Wednesday morning. At both places the girl graduates—and the boys—were pictures of health and happiness. Even though there were serious moments while the valedictorians were being read, the proceedings to the spectators, were full of interest. At St. Vincent's Convent, where the Rev. Father Duke presided during the absence of His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc, a delightful programme was presented which included vocal and instrumental music and the court scene from the Merchant of Venice. Miss Marguerite Frances McDonald and Miss Lucia Foley very cleverly taking the part of Portia and Shylock. There was also a patriotic number of which Miss Elizabeth Eugene Ritchie was queen of "Dreamland." Two pupils with really beautiful voices sang a short time with the Misses M. Dwyer and M. McDade. Miss Eleanor Boyce was valedictorian of her class. A very pleasing part of the programme was the presentation of the Ellis gold medal and the St. Vincent's Alumnae medal to Miss Kathleen Stanton who since her graduation has entered the order of the Redemptorist. The entire programme at St. Vincent's Convent was in keeping with the splendid reputation which this institution has acquired in past years during which time a number of the pupils have received the very highest scholastic honors possible. The graduates, all of whom were charming in pretty white frocks and carrying sheaves of white flowers, were addressed by the Rev. W. Duke, His Worship Mayor Pink, Rev. C. McCormack, superior of the Redemptorist Fathers, Mr. William McLean, inspector of schools, Rev. Miles Howland, Mr. Miles E. Agar and Dr. V. S. Bridges. Mrs. James Dever, member of the school board, was an interested spectator. In the large assembly hall of the High School on Union street on Wednesday morning an attractive scene was being enacted when sixty-five graduates of the school received their diplomas from Mr. R. B. Emerson, chairman of the board of school trustees. The Rev. R. J. Hastings addressed the graduates. Palms and cut flowers adorned the platform where the graduates were seated, the girls robed in dainty white lingerie frocks and carrying bouquets of flowers. Certificates were obtained by ten graduates from Grade XII. There was a very delightful programme prepared by the school orchestra of which Mr. Maunsel O'Neill is the capable leader. Mr. Ellis Taylor was the valedictorian of his class. Mr. Reginald Barracrough, Miss Gwendoline Ewing, Mr. Henry H. Macdonald, Mr. John Fitzpatrick, Mr. George Skinner were readers of brilliant essays. The course of some of the graduates of the school was also a feature of the programme, the parts of Portia and Shylock being acted by Miss Dora Corbett and Mr. Ellis Taylor in a manner worthy of professionals. Miss Celia Andrus's lovely voice was heard in a song and Rose Everywhere sang Miss Jean Somerville read a portion from Cicero. Mr. Maunsel O'Neill greatly pleased the audience by his violin solo, Bluebell of Scotland. On Wednesday evening a reception was held by the High School Alumnae in the assembly hall in Union street, in honor of the graduates of this year. The guests were received by Miss Lawson, president; Mrs. Harold Lawrence, Mrs. Taylor and Mrs. Alice Walker. St. Vincent's Alumnae, of which Mrs. George MacMurray is the president, celebrated the evening of Wednesday by entertaining the graduates at a handsomely arrayed dinner at Bond's. Mrs. MacMurray, in recognition of her work in regard to the alumnae, received a beautiful bouquet during the progress of the dinner.

At a very early hour on Wednesday morning in Trinity church by Rev. Ralph Sherman assisted by Rev. Canon Smithers, the marriage was solemnized of Miss Jessie Marguerite, daughter of Mrs. Joshua Knight and grand-daughter of Rev. Henry Spile, to the Rev. John Robinson Belyea, rector of Ormoco, the marriage ceremony having been followed by a nuptial celebration of the Holy Eucharist. The bride, who was given away by her uncle, Mr. L. B. Knight, was becomingly gowned in a tailored costume of fawn-colored cloth with hat of the same shade. Only the relatives and close friends of the bride were present at the ceremony. Mr. and Mrs. Belyea, after a honeymoon trip to Upper Canada, will reside in Ormoco. The bride has a great number of friends in St. John who extend to her and the Rev. Mr. Belyea their most sincere congratulations and best wishes for their future prosperity.
