# HYLAN PENSION BARRED BY COURT

Decision Keeps \$4,125 a Year From Former New York Mayor

ALBANY, Oct. 23.—Former Mayor John F. Hylan will not receive a pension from New York City, so the Court of Appeals has ordered. The decision was in an appeal from rulings of the lower courts in favor of a taxpayer's action brought by William Jay Schiefelbusch to restrain payment of a proposed pension of \$4,125 a year under a local law passed just before Mayor Hylan retired. Supreme Court Justice Prosser granted the original injunction. There was no opinion in the case by the Court of Appeals. Judges Pound and Cardozo dissented from the majority.

Under authority of the home rule amendment and act the Municipal Assembly of New York amended the New York City charter by reducing the retirement age from sixty to fifty-five years and the service requirement from ten to five years. Mayor Hylan, at the time of his retirement, was fifty-five years old and had been in the city's employment less than ten years.

The lower courts held that state and county employees within New York City were also affected by the law and the Municipal Assembly did not have the authority to change the system as to them.

# REV. M. C. HIGGINS TO PETITCODIAC

Accepts Call to Baptist Church, Succeeding Rev. Milton Addison

PETITCODIAC, Oct. 21.—Rev. M. C. Higgins, now of Surrey, has accepted the unanimous call of the Petitcodiac group of United Baptist churches made vacant by the resignation of Rev. Milton Addison some time ago. Rev. Mr. Higgins has just terminated a highly successful pastorate in the neighboring county of Albert, and his coming to Petitcodiac is looked forward to with eagerness.

The North River Baptist churches have secured in place of Rev. Mr. Francis, whose resignation has just become effective, Rev. J. B. Dimock, of Penobscot.

## DOCTOR IS LEAVING.

The community has learned with very sincere regret that Dr. J. Marshall is giving up his practice at Petitcodiac to take over a practice in Halifax city. Dr. Marshall has built up a large practice here and will be missed in social, professional and fraternal circles. He is leaving succeeded at Petitcodiac by Dr. W. A. Pullins, now practicing at Newtown, New Brunswick, and a classmate of Dr. Marshall.
