UGLY RUMORS FOLLOW HIS DISAPPEARANCE

Newcastle, N. B., July 14.—There is considerable stir in the little village of Chatham Head, directly opposite Newcastle, over the disappearance of James Babineau, of Acadiaville, Kent county, a married man aged fifty-three, without children. Last summer and this spring Babineau had worked at John Maloney's saw mill, Chatham Head. Four weeks ago he disappeared under very mysterious circumstances and has not been seen or heard of since. Ugly rumors were soon current about the man having been beaten or even killed, while some believed that he had fled the country for fear of assault or for some other reason.

Newcastle's chief of police, with another officer yesterday afternoon were told that it appears that Babineau was last seen in or around a house at Chatham Head occupied by two women. It is said that on the night on which Babineau went to the house for the last time, at least one other man was already there. The woman of the house told the police that on her return that night, after attending the Newcastle races, she found Babineau waiting for her, and that on his attempting to embrace her she had struck him. Babineau had then cleared out, and she had never seen him since. Another report is that Babineau was beaten by two men, perhaps three. A third man tells of two men asking him to help them beat Babineau, but he says he did not join in the assault but was home in bed when the racket occurred and merely heard the noise.

War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACKYARD GARDENERS. LISTED IN GREAT-ER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN

Issued by the Canada Food Board in Collaboration With Experts on the Staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm

SAVE YOUR CABBAGE.

It is about this time that the flies of the cabbage-maggot are most active, large numbers of eggs being deposited against the stems of young cabbage and cauliflower plants. The best preventive where these pests are concerned is the felt disk placed around the plant as soon as it is set. But for those who did not take this precaution earlier in the season cure rather than a preventive is now necessary. A good remedy is to dust the infested plants with fresh pyrethrum insect powder and air-dried lime or other dry diluent, one part of the former in four of the latter. After being thoroughly mixed together the powder and lime should be kept in a tight vessel for 24 hours before using. The mixture should be applied from a duster, sold by seedsmen, or from a cheesecloth bag tied on the end of a short stick, the operator holding the bag over the plants and tapping the stick with a cane held in the other hand. A mixture of Paris green and dry arsenate of lead may be safely used as a spray for cabbage until the heads are half formed, but not afterwards.

IN THE CHURCHES

The Rev. J. H. A. Holmes, the new rector of St. Jude's church, who conducted the services on Sunday, and made a very favorable impression on his congregation. There was a large attendance in the morning, when the Thirty-nine Articles were read by the rector. Rev. Mr. McCutcheon is now pastor of the First Baptist church, Montreal, and is visiting in the city. The subject of his evening sermon was French Evangelization or What the Grand Ligne Mission is Doing for the French-Canadians.

Yesterday was the monthly Communion Sunday of the Holy Name Society for the men of the Cathedral parish. At the 7 o'clock mass the men in large numbers received Holy Communion in a body. Last evening after vespers the usual instructional sermon was given by Rev. Wm. Duke, chaplain of the society.

NOTABLE TRIBUTE TO THE BRITISH EFFORT

AMERICANS MAY BE PUT ON TOBACCO RATIONS

Washington, July 15.—Government control of the tobacco industry of the United States may result from the heavy requirements of the Allies and the American military forces abroad. Rationing of the American population is believed to be a possibility.

Indians Are Giving Freely To The War

Commissioner-Sells Reports Returns From The Reservations Are Good

Washington, July 14.—Reports received by Cato Sells, commissioner of the Indian reservations, indicate a total Red Cross membership of close to 20,000, contributions in money amounting to more than \$50,000 and further donations of thousands of hospital garments and knitted articles.

The Omaha tribe recently held an auction for the Red Cross which netted \$2,000, including \$800 for a prize goat. The boys of a school in the northwest gathered 2,000 pounds of sphagnum moss for surgical absorbent pads. Some 400 Christmas boxes were also contributed. One of the larger schools reported a Students' Friendship War Fund, with \$750 on hand, and twelve war savings societies. This school in four weeks brought 1,000 thrift stamps and fourteen baby bonds.

On a small reservation far north, where the winters are long and severe and the Indians must struggle for the necessities of life, more than \$1 per capita for every adult was paid in cash for Red Cross and other war relief purposes. In the southwest, where the parched desert gives scant return and sheep raising is the chief means of support, many of the Indians have each promised a fleece of wool for the Red Cross and the superintendent plans the experiment of spinning this wool and knitting it into socks, sweaters, &c., by the Indian women.

In a Montana district where the Indians are nearly all full bloods they voluntarily held meetings and each one who has a growing wheat crop promised to donate one sack of wheat for war relief work. On another reservation where the Indians are very poor and have little ready money, they donated an abundance of handsome bead work and other curios to be sold for the Red Cross.

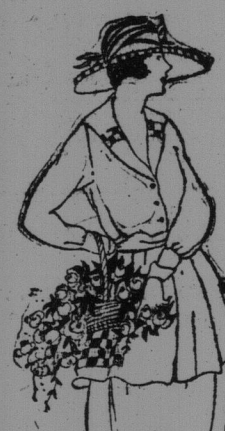
