### GIVES UP LIFE TRYING TO GET TO HIS MASTER

Greyhound Races Train Till He Falls  
Exhausted and Dies

South Norwalk, Conn., Jan. 24.—In a  
six-mile race between a Boston express and  
a blooded greyhound here, lion and steam  
proved too much for nature alone, and the  
dog dropped between the rails and died of  
exhaustion.  
Lucian Gray boarded the train here,  
and in the crowd Meteor, his greyhound,  
became separated from him. The train  
drew out and the dog started off at the  
side of the coach where Gray sat. Gray  
tried to have the train stopped, but his  
pleadings were unavailing. For fully a  
mile the dog retained his position at the  
side of the coach.  
Through Roxbury and Darien sped the  
principle in the novel race. A mile farther  
on the dog was forced to drop into the  
wake of the train. He hung on for  
some time, but finally collapsed.
