For each foot passenger, 10 cents. 2. That a Ferry be established across Renous River, in the Parish of Blackville, from Daniel M'Laughlan's, to the opposite shore of said River. That the following rates of ferriage be enacted and received. For each horse, or neat cattle, 12 cents. "horse and vehicle, 20 " passenger, calf, goat, pig, sheep or bbl. 5 " at the provisions of "A Bye-Law 3.
