Supt. Murdoch Says the Facilities for Supplying St. John With Water are Inadequate

Superintendent Murdoch, speaking to the Star recently of the water pressure, of which lately many complaints have been heard, said:

"The water pressure now is certainly not as good as it was before the winter set in. Along the line of the street railway the poor water pressure is particularly noticeable.
