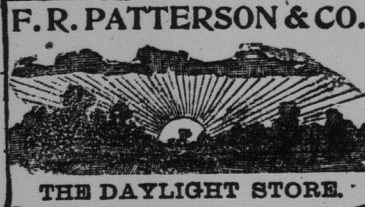

### BAPTIST CONVENTION

Closed at Truro Yesterday After a Successful Session.

TRURO, N. S., Aug. 24.—The Maritime Baptist convention closed its session this morning with a special meeting called to dispose of business crowded out of the regular meeting. The committee appointed to report on the union of the two churches was instructed to continue its labors. Various reports were heard and adopted. A resolution was passed by the convention to meet at St. John, N. S., the year book committee recommended that 2,000 copies be printed and sold at 10c. each. It was decided to call for a summer school next year. The committee on the century fund has collected \$187.82, in addition to the regular pledges. The chairman of the Maritime Publishing Co. suggested that the Messenger and Visitor, in its next issue, be made a special convention number.
