

TOKIO, Nov. 9, 4 p. m .- It is reported that the Japanese have completely sli-enced the forts on Rihlung and Susung mountains and that their main strength is now attacking Etse moun-Japanese continue to bombard Port Arthur and the shells are falling so incessantly that the Russians have practically abandoned the repair of the works protecting the harbor.
