It has transpired that he was coming to his bed on Friday morning and that time gradually lost strength until the end came, this morning. Mr. Fisher was a son of the late Mr. Peter Fisher, of Fredericton.

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QUARTER OF MILLION FIRE AT TRACADE.

Lumber Mills and Several Dwellings Destroyed--Loss is Total Insurance Companies Hard Hit. This was the news received here this morning by the insurance people, who are all quite badly hit, as the property was a valuable one and consequently the insurance was quite large. It is difficult to get any definite information, but from all that can be learned the fire occurred yesterday afternoon, and the loss is total, only a few small dwellings and a few shingles being left of what was a flourishing community.

TROUBLE MURDER IS STILL A MYSTERY

Three Persons--Arrested in Olney Case. All Discharged--Mothers of Murdered Children Fearfully Injured. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 7.--Carl Gill, a diamond salesman, who lives at No. 21 North Sixth street in this city, gave his automobile to a stranger at Millville, N. J., last Tuesday.

TIED OF HIS AUTO AND GAVE IT AWAY.

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Oct. 9.--All attempts of the county and local police officials to clear up the mystery of the Olney household who escaped death and who was found fearfully injured and unconscious in the barn. After being kept in custody all day and closely examined, Graham conclusively proved his innocence and was discharged from custody.

BOMBS HURLED AT RUSSIAN SOLDIERS--RIOTS YESTERDAY

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 8.--General Tropoff, assistant minister of the interior, has been informed by telephone from Moscow that serious disorders occurred there last night and that the situation was slightly more reassuring this morning. But the strike is spreading and the authorities evidently are really apprehensive. They are hopeful, however, that the St. Petersburg workers will not be affected.

EVIDENCE ALL IN IN COLE TRIAL.

Case Will go to Jury Tomorrow Morning--Prosecution Attempting Today to Discredit Witnesses for Defense. (See also page 7. (Special to the Star.) PORTLAND, Me., Oct. 9.--The state this morning put in its rebuttal evidence in the Cole murder trial and when the court adjourned at noon, all the evidence in the case had been presented. There was little new brought out in the morning session, the state's efforts being confined to discrediting the testimony of Blake, who was shown to have said that he was not at home at all on April 12. Blake is one of the witnesses on whom the defense relies to show that Cole repaid a couch at his own house on the day of the murder.

FRIGHTFUL ACCIDENT NEAR MONGTON.

Man Impaled on the Progs of a Pilehook--Bank Manager Nearly Drowned--Boy Thief Sentenced. MONGTON, N. B., Oct. 9.--A boy named Galaf Arsenau has been sentenced to three months jail for store breaking. Jacob Driedelle of Upper Amousoegan met with a frightful accident Saturday while working in an oat field he slipped from a wagon, being impaled on the progs of a fork which he carried. His injuries are very painful but it is thought will not be critical. Joseph Bruce of the Bank of Nova Scotia at Moncton while boating at Shediac Cape Saturday had a narrow escape. His boat capsized and he was thrown into the water but his cries were heard from shore and he was rescued in the nick of time. Mr. Bruce is spending his vacation in Moncton.

ROYAL BAND McLAUGHLIN BUILDING

The Royal Bank of Canada deal for the purchase of the McLaughlin building, corner of King and Canterbury streets, has been completed. The lease of the present occupants do not expire for a few years, and the bank will occupy their present quarters for a time. The lease of the American Clothing Co. does not expire until 1907, and when this is up the bank will make temporary quarters in the building. The lease of Brock & Paterson, who also occupy a portion of the building, will not be up for a few years later, but will be torn down and a fine large new building will be erected.

HOW BANK OWNERS STOLE MONEY

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 9.--According to information from Alamosa, Colo., the Schiffer Bros., owners of the suspended bank of Alamosa, one of whom is under arrest and the other is sought under a warrant obtained a large sum of money through the sale of stock of a cattle company they organized with 100,000 shares 4,000 of which were sold to Wm. Adams and Frank Adams, brothers of former governor Alva Adams. The remainder was purchased by the Dunn estate, of Del Nord. The allegation is made that subsequently the Schiffers duplicated the Dunn estate stock and sold it to J. A. Thatcher, president of the First National Bank of Pueblo.
