**U. S. EXPORTS SHOW
HALF A MILLION INCREASE**
Figures From Consul's Office Give Big
Increases in General Goods
and Lumber.

Statistics from the U. S. consul's of-
fice show that the increase in exports
from St. John to United States ports
for the year ending June 30, '07, were
\$407,416.61 higher than for the previous
year. There was an increase both in
general goods and in lumber. The fol-
lowing statement gives the details.

**KUROKI ENTERTAINS
THE U. S. AMBASSADOR**
Nice Things Were Said at the Dinner and
No Mention Was Made of Any
Troubles.

TOKYO, July 5.—General Baron Kuro-
ki, the Japanese Imperial Envoy to the
Jamestown Exposition, gave a luncheon
today in honor of Luke E.
Wright, the United States Ambassador.
Field Marshal Oyama, representing the
army, expressed himself in the most
appreciative terms of the magnificent
and enthusiastic reception accorded
General Kuroki and his party every-
where in the United States. His phra-
seology was one long chain of superlatives
of gratifying appreciation in which
the Japanese language is particularly
rich. Ambassador Wright made an ap-
propriate response and the most cor-
dial feeling prevailed. The anti-Japan-
ese, or what is here known as the Amer-
ican question, was completely ignor-
ed.
