

Synopsis of Canadian North- west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of
a family, or any male over 18 years old,
may homestead a quarter-section of
available Dominion land in Manitoba,
Saskatchewan or Alberta. The ap-
plicant must appear in person at the Do-
minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency
for the district. Entry by proxy may
be made at any agency, on certain
conditions, by father, mother, son,
daughter, brother or sister of intend-
ing homesteader.

Duties.—Six month residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each of
three years. A homesteader may live
within nine miles of his homestead on
a farm of at least 40 acres solely owned
and occupied by him or by his
father, mother, son, daughter, brother
or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in
good standing may pre-empt a quar-
ter-section of available Dominion land.
Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must re-
side six months in each of six years
from date of homesteader's entry (includ-
ing the time required to earn home-
stead patent) and cultivate fifty acres
extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his
homestead right and cannot obtain a
pre-emption may take a purchased
homestead in certain districts. Price
\$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside
six months in each of three years, cul-
tivate fifty acres and erect a house
worth \$200.00.

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FEAR BERNIER HAS PERISHED IN FAR NORTH

MONTREAL, Sept. 2.—A good deal
of anxiety is being expressed in gov-
ernment marine circles over the dis-
appearance of Capt. Bernier, Canada's
ambitious explorer. Capt. Bernier left
Quebec on a voyage to the Northern

BOSTON, Sept. 3.—A. K. McLean, M.
P. of Lunenburg, and Augustus P.
Gardner, Congressman from Gloucester
District, met at the Parker House
to discuss the best means of bringing
about an international agreement to
regulate the steam trawling evil which
is objectionable to Gloucester, Cana-
dian, Newfoundland and St. Pierre
fishermen. Both men represent the
fishing centres in New England and
Nova Scotia but have no official au-
thority from their governments. Nei-
ther would tell what they decided upon,
but it is understood it was
agreed that both Canada and the
United States should co-operate in an
effort to get France to come into some
arrangement whereby steam trawling
should be regulated or restricted.

An embarrassing factor in the fish-
eries middle is the continued opera-
tions of the Boston trawler spray,
which has been erroneously reported
as having gone out of business. The
Frenchmen point to her success as a
reason why they should continue their
own operations, and argue that they,
too, promise revolutionizing of the
fishing business which, as international
law and agreements now stand,
they have a perfect right to under-
take.

Another phase of the question relates
to the control which the various gov-
ernments might have of their own fish-
ermen provided an agreement were
reached among them. The French
boats are subsidized and in addition
France has a grip upon her fishermen
through their position as enlisted men
of the French navy. France, however,
is alert for the interests of her fish-
ermen and will not call them off unless
some agreement is reached which will
guarantee their prosperous future.

WOMAN ONCE RICH IN JAIL FOR THEFT

Former New York Resident,
a Victim of Morphine Ar-
rested in Chicago

CHICAGO, Sept. 2.—Mrs. Frances
Everett, 40 years old, who said she
once mingled in New York society and
that she had wealthy relatives in the
east told a pitiful story to Municipal
Judge Morrison today after pleading
guilty to a charge of larceny.

Mrs. Everett was charged with steal-
ing silver and clothing valued at \$75
from Mrs. E. Mullen, owner of a
boarding house.

"I beg you to be lenient with me,"
Mrs. Everett said to the court. "I am
an unfortunate woman. I was addic-
ted to the use of morphine for more
than a year, but that does not mean
that I am a bad woman."

"I was a wealthy woman once. My
father is a graduate of Yale. I have
been to Europe six times. I was
married to Frank Roberts in 1883, and
we lived for a time in Elizabeth, N. J.
Frank was killed and I fell heir to \$30,000."

"In 1888 I married a man named
Boist, a grocer in New York. I even-
tually became penniless."

SPAIN HAS FUNDS TO CONTINUE WAR

Minister of Finance Denies
Rumor Loan is Needed, De-
claring Reserve is Ample

MADRID, Sept. 2.—A cabinet council
today discussed the operations at
Melilla and the negotiations with
Sultan Mulay Hafid's envoy, which
are dragging along. It is probable the
special envoys will remain here a long
time yet.

Statements that foreign influence is
jeopardizing the action of the Spanish
army and that limitation of its action
has been advised are strongly denied
by the government. Senator Aldean-
azar, the Foreign Minister, declared
today to Madrid newspaper corre-
spondents that peace will be estab-
lished when the Kabyles have received
merited punishment.

General Linares is said to have in-
sisted to the King a decree calling
up yearly 65,000 recruits for instruc-
tion.

The rumor that a loan would be
asked for has been denied by the
Minister of Finance. He says the
stock of gold in the treasury amounts
to more than 75,000,000 pesetas. There
is, besides, the cash ready for the
payment of the next dividend on the
funds.

The King has ordered the picture of
Captain Magarejo to be hung in the
officer's room at the palace. Captain
Magarejo was one of the King's aides-
de-camp and was mortally wounded in
the fight of July 27. When he fell he
handed his insignia as aide-de-camp
to a soldier in order to prevent it
from falling into the hands of the
enemy.
