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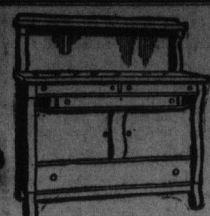
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OBITUARY

MESSRS. TILLEY OF ST. JOHN AND SMITH OF CHARLOTTE MAKE SPLENDID SPEECHES

Former Points Out That the Present Government
Would Increase Debt \$9,600,000 in Eight Years
at Present Rate Should They Continue in Office
—Mr. Smith Tells of Government "Economy."

Fredericton, June 12.—Monday
night's session of the Legislature did
not adjourn until early this morning.
Mr. LeBlanc of Restigouche was one
of the speakers. No practical sugges-
tion came from the windy member for
Restigouche, as to the methods for in-
creasing the revenue, but he made the
point that he was simply playing the politi-
cal game. In this respect he was dif-
ferent from the other Acadian mem-
ber, Mr. Michaud, of Madawaska, who
also addressed the House. The latter
came out openly in favor of increased
stampage rates while he also suggest-
ed to the government the desirability
of reclaiming the lands of the New
Brunswick Railway Company.

Mr. Tilley Follows.

Mr. Tilley followed Mr. LeBlanc.
The senior member for St. John city is
always a good speaker and his address
was an able effort. As showing the
absurdity of the claims of honorable
members opposite them nothing good
could exist on his side of the House.
Mr. Tilley referred to the administra-
tion's magnificent record in increas-
ing the stumpage returns from \$180,
135.45 in 1907, to \$364,042.52 in 1916.
He questioned the fairness pursued by
the government in the state-
ment of the bonded debt such liabil-
ties as those in connection with the
International Railway and the Minio
Railway, which the province would
never be called upon to meet by rea-
son of the arrangements which the
late administration had consummated.

Mr. Tilley showed that the govern-
ment's hostilities in regard to hav-
ing to the province the amount previ-
ously paid for the collection of suc-
cession duties were not justified. The
average annual cost for the collection
of these fees for the past nine years
had been \$2,385 and the government
paid a deputy attorney general \$2,000
for work previously attended to by the
former attorney general in order to
allow the present incumbent to stay
at his home in Bathurst where the
enormous saving to the people of the
province.

Government's Inconsistency.

The member for St. John showed the
inconsistency of the government's
course in claiming that the increase
of \$3,000,000 in the debt under the
late administration was exorbitant.
If the present government followed out
the start they had made and increased
the debt by \$1,200,000 annually they
would have an increase of \$9,600,000
should they be successful in holding
on to power for eight years, as com-
pared with the increase of three mil-
lion dollars for the eight years under
the late government. Mr. Tilley also
referred to the very bad taste shown
by Mr. LeBlanc in his remark relative
to the win the war convention. He
(Tilley) would be prepared to support
any government that stood for con-
scription and he would challenge his
honorable friend to say whether he
(LeBlanc) would vote for a conscrip-
tion resolution such as had been unan-
imously passed by the House when in-
troduced by Col. Guthrie. Mr. Le-
Blanc made no answer.

Other matters of provincial interest
were discussed by Mr. Tilley in the
course of his splendid speech. He
came out strongly for increased suc-
cessions rates and made the govern-
ment show considerable uneasiness
when he discussed the necessity
of such action.

Mr. Tilley said he had no intention
of discussing conscription or the win
the war convention, but he did intend
to discuss some of the points raised
by the hon. gentlemen opposite in con-
nection with the finances of the provin-
ce. He would call to their attention
the fact that at least some credit was
due the late government for an in-
crease in the revenue. In 1908 under
the old regime stampage receipts had
been \$180,135.43. In 1916 under the
late government the stampage reve-
nue had been \$364,042. There was a
great difference.

The total liability and bonded in-
debtedness had been said by the hon.
member from Moncton to total \$20,
000,000, but in making that statement
he had not taken into account liabil-
ities which had been reduced. The
International Railway which had been
taken over by the Canadian Govern-
ment Railway was one and the Fred-
erickton and Grand Lake Railway, now
a part of the C.P.R., was another. In
these particulars the pro-tem minister
of finance did not give due justice to
the province or his own financial
statement. The government support-
ers were open to the charge of insin-
cerity in claiming that economy would
be secured through the appointment of
a deputy attorney general. For the
past nine years the attorney general
had collected the succession duties
without a deputy. The real saving
brought about by the appointment
would amount to no more than \$55.
Speakers on the opposite side of the
House had placed great weight upon
the fact that in the last eight years
the provincial debt had increased \$3,
451,000. Yet one of the first acts of
the new administration had been to
increase the public debt \$700,000 for
permanent bridges and half a million
for highways, an increase in bonded
indebtedness of \$1,200,000.

Increase of Debt.

Hon. Mr. Veniot said that the hon.
gentleman must not forget that his
own party was responsible for half a
million of that \$700,000.

Mr. Tilley said he was pleased to
see the government follow the exam-
ple of its predecessors in any good
thing, but on the statement of the

minister of public works the present
administration already had increased
the debt \$700,000. In eight years at
that rate the increase would be \$5,
600,000.

The hon. gentleman from Resti-
gouche had gone back of 1908 to re-
fer to certain matters. His hon.
friends opposite should not forget the
wise words of their premier uttered
during the recent campaign and to the
effect that he washed his hands prior
to 1908. These words had shown his
sound business common sense. He
had washed his hands of anything
prior to 1908 because there were mat-
ters which he did not want disturbed.
Hon. Mr. Foster remarked that in-
teresting things had happened since
1908 that certain people did not want
disturbed.

Favors Suffrage.

Mr. Tilley continuing said he ad-
mitted there had been some interesting
things on his own side of the House
which some of his party would like to
wash their hands of. That was one of
the reasons why he hoped women
would be admitted to the franchise.
He believed that the entrance of wo-
men into provincial affairs would re-
sult in better conditions. In this mat-
ter he had experienced a change of
heart.

Hon. Mr. Robinson remarked that
there was still hope for the member
from St. John.

Mr. Tilley continuing said that it
was unwise for the member from
Restigouche to go into the matter of
conscription. All those on the Speak-
er's left were prepared to support any
government, irrespective of party,
which would put through a measure
for conscription in New Brunswick or
any other part of Canada. Could the
member from Restigouche say that?
He (Tilley) had understood him to say
that he would not support such a mea-
sure.

Mr. LeBlanc denied that he ever had
made such a statement and said that
he did not make it now.

Mr. LeBlanc Got His.

Mr. Tilley accepted the statement
and continuing said that opposition
members who had attended the win
the war convention were sending in
no bills for expenses. He was sur-
prised to learn that the hon. member
from Restigouche was having his ex-
penses paid. Perhaps as he had re-
ceived no good from the convention he
would not present his bill.

What was the premier going to do
about the alleged outstanding deficit
of \$147,000? He (Tilley) had expect-
ed some statement concerning an in-
crease in stampage to meet that liabil-
ity.

Mr. McGrath asked if the hon. mem-
ber from St. John wanted the govern-
ment to collect another bonus.

Mr. Tilley replied that at the time
of the collection of that bonus the plain
inference had been that the province
had been faked out of the money justly
due it. Let the government proceed
to collect. During the late campaign
there had been tales of non-political
commission to be appointed to admin-
ister the Crown lands. After the gov-
ernment had taken office there had
been a change. Friends had come
round and had used arguments and
now there was no intimation of an in-
crease in stampage or the creation of
a commission.

Compliments from Mr. Michaud.

Mr. Michaud said that there were
excellent reasons for an increase in
stampage and the hon. gentlemen op-
posite were to be congratulated on the
fact that during the eight years they
had been in power the provincial reve-
nue had been increased.

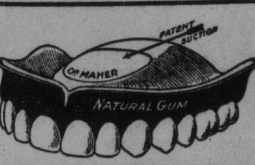

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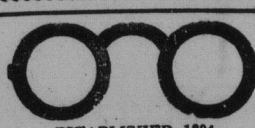
