Charles Jewtraw
Won At Saranac

Charlie Gorman Finished 2nd in 440—Is Third on Points—Skated Remarkably Well

Saranac Lake, N.Y., Feb. 3.—Charles Jewtraw, of Lake Placid, earned the United States amateur skating championship title here today by winning the 440 yard and three mile events in the close of a three day tourney.

Jewtraw, 120; Roy McWhorter, of Chicago, 80; Charles Gorman, of St. John, N. B., 80; Joe Moore, of New York, 30; Mike Goodman, of Winnipeg, 20; R. Donovan, of Minneapolis, 20; Jack Stowell, of Minneapolis, 10.
The big crowd showed enthusiasm as the last event came to a close, giving Jewtraw the championship. The popular Adirondack skater was picked up and borne from the lake on the shoulders of his admirers.

Sensational Finish
The 440 yard event was the sensation, not only of the day, but of the entire meet. Jewtraw and Gorman were bunched at the finish and literally dove for the tape. In the three mile race Moore was leading the field when he fell just before the final lap.

Martin Brewster, of Lake Placid, won the junior championship for boys at 18. Harold Rutledge for boys of 14 and Daniel Van Norwick, of Saranac Lake, took the honors for boys in the 12-year-old class.

Wind Was Responsible
For Giant Snowballs

Avon, N. Y., Feb. 3.—When Peter Finigan went out to do the chore one morning recently he was mystified by the sight of a large number of bare snowballs scattered over his farm. On the 20-acre field there were hundreds of them ranging in size from 6 to 18 inches in diameter. Lending up to each snowball was a streak of bare ground showing the distance it had travelled in forming.

Mr. Finigan and neighbors who gathered to study the odd spectacle decided that the wind which had blown a gale the night before had whipped up small particles of "good packing" snow and started them down the field, some of the particles gathered up additional snow until balls had been formed that were too heavy for the wind to move further. All the paths of the snowballs were in the same general direction that the wind had been blowing.

To record the unusual freak of wind and snow, Mr. Finigan sent for the correspondent of a Buffalo newspaper who "counted" more than 1,000 snowballs of more than 10 inches in diameter.

Boston Schooner
Will Be Eligible

Racer "Mayflower" Will be Finished in Time to Go Fishing April 30.

London, Feb. 3.—Boston men who are interested in the construction of the schooner Mayflower as a contender for the international cup for fishing vessels next fall, said tonight that they had received word from the committee at Halifax, N. S., that the Mayflower would be eligible to compete if she was completed in time to start her for the fishing grounds by April 30. The Gloucester Board of Trade recently received a communication under a section of the cup agreement, providing that in order to be eligible a vessel must have been engaged in deep sea fisheries for at least one season.

It was explained tonight that the fishing season in Nova Scotia began in April, and that it would be impossible to complete the construction of the Mayflower by April 1. The Halifax committee had agreed to permit her entry if she was on the way to the fishing grounds by April 30. The Boston syndicate has been assured by the builders at Essex that this condition will be fulfilled.
