Fredricton, April 15.—(Special)—Carrie Nation arrived from St. John by the 9.10 train, and was met at the C. P. R. station by a crowd. As she stepped from the train she beheld a large sign, bearing the word "Welcome," which the university boys had procured for her. The stationmaster created a decided sensation here this evening, paying a visit to a number of places where liquor is supposed to be sold. She roared quietly in her room during the afternoon, and at 7 o'clock ordered a coach and set out to do the town. She called at four drug stores, three hotels, one beer saloon and also visited the officers' quarters and made an unsuccessful effort to gain admittance to the soldiers' barracks.

A crowd of upwards of 1,000 men and boys followed her about the streets and urged her on with frequent speech and shouts of approval. She did not recede to the argument at any of the places visited, but contented herself with delivering temperance lectures for the benefit of the men in charge and spectators, who crowded about her.

At the soldiers' barracks the gate was closed against her, and the sentry gave her to understand that only soldiers and their families were admitted. She was not deterred, however, and after waiting for some time she succeeded in gaining admittance to the soldiers' barracks.

After finishing her crusade Mrs. Nation addressed a monster mass meeting at the Opera House. The meeting was without a chairman, but the audience was orderly and gave her a most attentive hearing. She spoke for over an hour with great vigor, and her remarks were frequently punctuated by applause. At the close she did a thrilling thing in souvenir bottles and booklets.

Mrs. Nation goes to Amherst tomorrow morning.
