Timothy Mahoney was given in charge by Timothy Keenan for assaulting a man on Mrs. O'Brien's boarding-house on Prince Wm. St. Timothy is indigenous to the Ottawa region, a Grit, probably by looks. He took the Magistrate O'Brien by storm last night. No one appeared to prosecute the Magistrate asked him how he got into such a scrape.
