PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Continuation of the Debate on the Navigation of the St. Lawrence—Mackenzie's Amendment.

OTTAWA, May 6.

Mr. Patterson read extracts from the Minutes of Council, showing that the Government are now opposed to the Washington Treaty. He could prove, from Morgan's Parliamentary Companion, that the majority of the people were against the Government.

Sir John wanted him to produce the figures.

Mr. Patterson said he had them.

Mr. Wood could not condemn the Washington Treaty, as a whole. It might be the best in the interests of all parties.

He condemned the Government for not supporting it from the first. They had condemned it, then consented to it, then defended it as perfect. He argued that we received no return for surrendering the St. Lawrence. The House should declare that no surrender of rights be made in future.

Glass said if the navigation of the Columbia was the only thing omitted it was trifling. We had the right to that river.

The treaty should not be discussed in sections, but as a whole.

Mackenzie contended that Ontario had given a majority against the Government, and, therefore, they were beaten. The country had been humiliated by the conduct of its Commissioner at Washington.

The policy of the States was to press northward, the Canadian Government virtually conceding that the Parliament should not reason why the Parliament should not defend our rights. To bring the matter fairly up he would move an amendment to the address to be presented to the Queen stating that Canada should have been consulted before the surrender of the St. Lawrence, and before the surrender of rights in future.

Whites said if he had been in the House last Session he would have voted for the Washington Treaty.

Sir John Macdonald made a severe and brilliant speech. He condemned the second session of Mackenzie. The rock on which Canada had been nearly wrecked was Nationalism. The will of Ontario was now arranging other Provinces against her.

Another Midnight Victory for the Government.

OTTAWA, May 6.

Ontario was not the dominant power. Mr. Brierley's resolution was out of date, the question having been settled. The resolution was a censure on the British Government in part, and the remainder would be honorable and would create the impression in the States that we were dissatisfied with our position.

Such an impression would lessen our chances for reciprocity and increase the States the hope of annexation. He hoped that the vanity of the Opposition would soon be satisfied with honorable resolutions, and then allow the business of the country to go on.

Baker concluded the debate in one of his best and bitterest speeches. He did not argue the question, but, knowing Sir John could not reply, attacked him in scathing terms, charging him with inciting banded our rights for trumpets and setting our claims by abandoning them.

The vote was taken at midnight on Mackenzie's amendment. It was lost—55 yeas, 90 nays.

Smith, Ferris, CUTLER, and Pickett were absent. The remainder of the New Brunswick voters as usual.

Marine and Fisheries for 1873.

This is a bulky blue-book of nearly 600 pages, embracing information of the year's transactions in connection with twenty-two different branches of the public service; such as the whole system of Canadian light-houses, river and harbor police, national steamers, regulations about ocean and lake marine, harbors, fisheries, &c., &c. Necessarily it gives a very considerable amount of interesting information on the various matters of which it treats, and shows how the country in this respect makes progress.

As the navigation of Lake Superior becomes every year of more importance, efforts have been made to increase its safety by the erection of additional light-houses. Three of these were begun last year and are now nearly finished, while others are under contract. During the season of 1872 there were 88 lights in operation in Ontario waters, with 40 booms and two triangles, maintained by the Dominion Government.

Of course it is exceedingly useless, as well as the Gulf, and should be well lighted. The shipping, increased so much as to be increasing yearly, and the number of lights is becoming very considerable.

On the 26th of December, 1872, the number of lights in New Brunswick was 45. The number of lights in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, taken together, has been increased to 75, and there are now ten under contract.

Steamships have been erected, and there are now ten under contract.

The total shipping registered in Canada in 1871 amounted to 776,945 tons. In 1871 this had increased to 837,869 tons.

It may be mentioned in this connection that a deputation from the London Trading Company visited Canada and the United States to examine their respective systems of lights and lightships, and to report thereon to their respective Governments.

The fishery season of 1872 was an average one in point of quantity, but brilliant in point of money value. There are four leadings under which all the different kinds of fish caught are arranged, namely, cod, herring, salmon, and other fish and oils.

The products of fish and fish oils are of great value to the country, and it is registered as some British ports.
