LONDON, Sept. 23.—p. m.  
English markets quiet.  
The Empress of Russia is expected to arrive in England, Oct. 15th, on a visit to her daughter, the Duchess of Edinburgh. Elections to fill vacancies in the French National Assembly will take place on the 18th of October.

New York, Sept. 23.—p. m.  
The New York Republican State Convention to-day nominated Gov. Dix for re-election.  
A despatch from Gov. Kellogg to-day reports New Orleans quiet; also the interior country so far as heard from.  
Outbreaks by the white league are threatened in Alabama, and troops are to be sent.

KENTUCKY.  
A detachment of State troops has been sent from Louisville to protect the Court in Owensboro, Owen County.

SOUTH CAROLINA.  
The excitement in Edgefield, S. C., has subsided, and there are no immediate apprehensions of further disturbances between the races. Accounts from the scene of trouble report all quiet.

On Thursday, September 17, two drunken Indians, Peter Glode and Philip Penell, belonging to Gold River, Chester, made a raid on the house of George Kater. Penell had a gun and threatened to shoot them. The family were dreadfully frightened. The women and children fled to the woods and remained there till midnight. Kater ran to a neighbor's house and borrowed a gun loaded with small shot, and fired at the Indians, whereby Glode was slightly injured, but Penell is badly wounded, having received nearly the whole charge in his face and breast. Glode has been taken to Lunenburg jail.—H. Recorder.

A singular mishap occurred to Mr. Scott-Siddons a few days ago. It appears that Mrs. Siddons and Seraphine were announced to give a morning entertainment at Ryde on Saturday, but, in consequence of a sad mistake, it had to be postponed at short notice. Not long ago Mrs. Siddons was thrown from her horse, and injured. She was confined about a week ago and caused her husband to be very anxious, but the maid remained the brandy in the glass on the table, and the cause was cleared by mistake. She hoped to fulfill her engagement but at the last moment found it impossible.—London Herald, Aug. 26.
