AN OPPORTUNITY TO ADVANCE.

"Herein lurks Opportunity. seat-warmers and the whiners will heed it not. But those whose hearts are aflame with a righteous desire for worthy gain, will stretch out welcoming hands and measure off their share of fame and fortune."

The Executive Board of the Canadian League for the Advancement of Colored People has set aside a substantial sum to encourage and to assist worthy boys and girls in securing an education. This was done because after very careful investigation, it was found that very few of our boys and girls are fully prepared to answer the call of real opportunity when she does rap at their doors. Further the Board had in mind this fact: in order that colored citizens or ANY citizens may be able to maintain a high standard of citizenship in order that they may become well-balanced, well rounded men and women and to be able to take their proper places in the community, an education, and a liberal education, is in-
