COMPANY NOT BOUND TO GIVE ANY NUMBER

MONTREAL, March 3.—The pleadings of the Bell Telephone Company have been maintained by Mr. Justice Bruneau in the practice division of the superior court against the injunction proceedings instituted by David Legault against F. X. Beauchamp, in which the petitioner sought to compel respondent to surrender and the telephone company to give him the number St. Louis 3933.

The court ruled that the telephone company was not bound to give any particular number to a particular person. The contract was to supply service and not a particular number. The petition for a writ of injunction was therefore dismissed with costs.

SAYS RADIALS ARE A LUXURY

Expert Declares Many Lines Are Now in Financial Difficulties.

TORONTO, March 3.—A somewhat discouraging view on radial railway lines was given at the inquiry by a royal commission into the radial railway projects of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission here this afternoon by Robert M. Feustel, president of the Indiana Service Corporation. Mr. Feustel has had experience as a consulting radial expert.

FAIR RUN OF SAP IN RUTHVEN DISTRICT

RUTHVEN, March 3.—That the recent heavy snowfall was the very best thing that could have happened to a crop standpoint is the opinion expressed by farmers all through this district. Tons of fertilizer have been placed on the land recently and with the moisture from the melting snow will, it is expected, place the soil in ideal condition for splendid growth.

Great numbers of maple trees are being tapped this week. So far there is a fair run of sap, but it is not expected that it will continue very long, and no great quantity of syrup will likely be made this season.

PORTER WRECK PROBE WILL BEGIN TODAY

VALPARAISO, Ind., March 3.—Official investigation into deaths of 37 persons killed at Porter, Indiana, Sunday night in the Michigan Central-New York Central train wreck will be opened tomorrow by Dr. H. O. Seldel, coroner.

OFFICER SAYS \$2,000 BRIBE WAS OFFERED

Alleged Taxi Driver Wanted Him To Leave Whiskey Shipment.

WINDSOR, March 3.—Bail of \$2,000 has been granted Cecil Smith, taxi driver, charged with offering bribe money to William Allen, a provincial officer under W. J. Lannin. Smith is alleged to have offered \$2,000 to Allen to "walk away" and leave 250 cases of liquor with Smith and his friends.

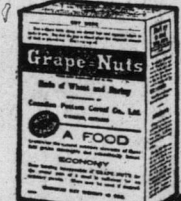
FORMER MILLIONAIRE MAY HAVE SUICIDED

CAR WORK MAY GO TO DETROIT

Settlement of Wage Question Involves Far-Reaching Consequences.

ST. THOMAS, March 3.—Falling in a proposed wage settlement with the employees now waiting for reinstatement the information comes from a railway official that the Detroit Car Company or a similar industry may be given the contract for the construction of cars, the building of which has hitherto been undertaken at the local shops of the Michigan Central.

DANGEROUS GANG MAY BE DEPORTED

CLEVELAND, Ohio, March 3.—Plans which involved the planned assassination of Cleveland citizens connected with the Loyal American League, the destruction by dynamite of downtown buildings and an intensive campaign of anarchistic propaganda throughout the city are believed "now to have been" slipped by the arrest here last Tuesday night of eight men said to be members of an anarchistic group.

The arrests were made by agents of the department of justice working in co-operation with officers of the Loyal American League. The eight men are now in the county jail, facing charges under the espionage law, which Government officials believe will lead to their deportation.

TILSONBURG, March 3.—It was with regret that citizens learned that the resignation of J. E. Teckoe as superintendent of the local hydro-electric system had been accepted by the hydro commission. Mr. Teckoe has accepted the position of manager of the hydro-electric system at Niagara Falls. He was selected out of many applicants.

Mr. Teckoe has been in charge of the local hydro system for eight years, and careful and conscientious performance of his duties has marked his service. Mr. Teckoe will assume his new duties on April 1.

MRS. GEORGE MERCER DIES AT THAMESFORD

THAMESFORD, March 3.—After a long illness, Jane Mercer, widow of George Mercer Sen., died at her home here. She was in her 87th year. Her husband predeceased her seven years ago. She is survived by three sons, George and Walter of the village, Alexander of Hamilton, and two daughters. Interment was made in St. Andrew's Cemetery this afternoon.

MUST STAND TRIAL FOR MANSLAUGHTER

TORONTO, March 3.—Harry G. Barnes, wife merchant of St. Catharines, was committed at Port Credit, Ontario, today for trial on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of William Rosseter of this city, who was killed by an auto on the Toronto-Hamilton highway on September 13 last. Barnes pleaded not guilty at the preliminary hearing. He will be tried at the next assizes in Brampton, Ont. He was admitted to bail in \$10,000.
