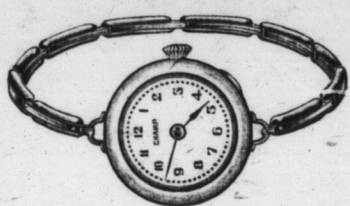

Fley Squires of Melbourne has enlisted in the flying corps at Melbourne.

Duncan Paterson, a former Bothwell man, died at Chatham from the effects of drinking a quantity of bay rum.

Wm. R. Roseburg of Winnipeg, a former Bothwell hardware dealer, died suddenly while returning from a hunting trip.

Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the barn and outbuildings of John Dugan, near Alvinston, a few nights ago.

The death occurred at Waskada, Manitoba, of Mrs. C. L. Capron, daughter of Thos. Harris of the Watford Guide-Advocate.

The Young Women's Christian Association have leased the Fraser hotel at London and will fit it up for a boarding house for girls.

During the week of London fair thirty auto drivers were caught by special constables for speeding on the roads near the city.

At Forest Bruce Sutherland, aged five years, was run over by a heavy wagon while playing on the street and was instantly killed.

New motor cars to the number of 25,000 were purchased by residents of Ontario this year. License fees for the year will exceed \$900,000.

The Manitoba government will spend \$125,000 for the purchase of sheep in Ontario and will sell these at cost to the farmers of the province.

Since the manufacture of whiskey ceased in the United States Canadian stuff that sold at \$5 per gallon has gone up in price to \$15 per gallon.

Samuel Lethbridge has disposed of his fine 130-acre farm west of Fingal to Lewis J. Gifford, of Tilbury East township, near Merlin, for \$10,000.

The engine and four cars of Wabash passenger train No. 2 left the rails near Komulus, Mich., one day last week and the engineer and fireman were injured.

To overcome in a measure the apple famine a Simcoe woman experimented with the berries of the mountain ash for making jelly and met with excellent results.

William D. Stanley, for 25 years one of the Middlesex County auditors and one of the best known residents of London and Biddulph, died in Victoria Hospital on Wednesday.

Nine hundred acres of corn which had been grown for the Stratford canning factory is a complete loss as a result of the recent frost, and no corn will be handled there this season.

A Nova Scotia wool dealer recently sold a consignment of 14,000 lbs. of washed wool in the United States at 95c a pound. The best of the sheep should again be heard in the land.

The Middlesex Milk Producers' Association at London have decided to defer increasing the wholesale price of milk to \$2.20 per cwt. for the succeeding six months as was intended.

Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Smith of Cairo announce the marriage of their youngest daughter, Miss Mary, to James Haywood at the Presbyterian manse, Knox Church, Regina, Sask., on Sept. 22.

The onion crop at Leamington has been the best in years and dealers are now buying at \$2.30 per bag. One large grower will probably realize \$40,000 from his crop and others all the way from \$1,000 to \$20,000.

The first draft under the military service act is to be called out, according to present arrangements, on the 10th of October. This call includes men from 20 to 34, inclusive, unmarried or widowers without children.

While going down the basement stairs at the home of her daughter in Watford, Mrs. Barnes, widow of the late S. D. Barnes, tripped and fell headlong to the basement floor, breaking her neck and dying almost immediately.

The house and stable and private garage of Leo Wilson of Delaware, the well-known oil driller, were totally destroyed by fire a few days ago, together with an adjoining barn, the property of Robert Hepburn. Mr. Wilson lost considerable of his household effects.

That scores of citizens of Chatham and vicinity have been victimized recently by bogus photo enlargers is indicated by the finding of several hundred photographs in a vacant house in that city. The photos apparently had been left in the house by the swindlers.

That the imperative and pressing need of men at the front will not permit of the granting of a furlough to the men of the first contingent was the substance of a letter received from the minister of militia in answer to petitions circulated recently at London, Ontario.

Elderberries have been very plentiful in the Newbury district and are in great demand by housewives. They were damaged to a considerable extent by frost. Nuts of all kinds are a very good crop. Hazelnuts are now ripe, and old residents say they never saw the bushes so laden.

Garden thieving is prevalent in and around Dutton. A potato patch in the centre of the village and under the glare of the electric lights was raided and about twenty-five hills dug. Neil Tatum had a couple of bushels of onions taken from his field, and the garden of Williamson Atkinson was stripped of all the tomatoes.

Fifty years ago there were 100 flax mills in Canada, but at the time the war started three years ago the industry was extinct. At best eight or nine factories were in operation. The industry has been revived by the war, and during the coming winter there will be 30 or 40 mills in operation. The Ontario farmers planted 8,000 acres this year of this crop the uses of which are perhaps more varied than any.

POPULAR GLENCOE FAIR

Big Crowd and Splendid Exhibits This Year.

Fine weather contributed to the success of the Mosa and Ekfrid annual fair at Glencoe last week, and in every respect it was considered to have been one of the best if not the best ever held by the society. Entries in nearly all the departments exceeded those for some years in numbers, and the quality of the exhibits was in keeping with the splendid agricultural section surrounding Glencoe.

The show of horses and other live stock was particularly good. In the crystal palace the display of women's hand children's work was well up to the standard, with upwards of 800 entries, and the display of vegetables was exceedingly fine, showing that in the Glencoe district this has been a good vegetable year. The grain and corn exhibits were also of a high grade, particularly the wheat. The only part of the exhibition which was at all below normal was the fruit section, which, on account of the failure of the apple crop, was much below average.

Several fine collections of plants and flowers were an added attraction to the indoors exhibits. These were shown by J. Briggs, J. A. McLachlan and J. McMillan.

The entertainment features of the exhibition consisted of three races—a free-for-all, a 250 class event and a named race. A keener interest would have been taken in these had the horses been locally owned. Music was furnished by the Wardville brass band, and a merry-go-round was liberally patronized by the children.

At the opera house in the evening a play entitled "Brown-eyed Betty" was put on by "The Young People's Dramatic Club," of the Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church Young People's Guild of London. There was a crowded house and the audience showed appreciation. For young amateurs the members of the cast took their respective parts very creditably, several displaying considerable natural ability. Specialty features by Miss Jean Walker, elocutionist, and two soloists and a Scotch choir were particularly pleasing. O'Neill's orchestra of Ridge town furnished popular music.

The fair from a financial standpoint should show a good surplus. Gate receipts were \$385, grand stand \$80, ground privileges \$80, concert \$175. There are 180 members, and the total entries numbered about 2,400.
