MAIN POINTS OF THE PLAN

Interest has been evoked by announcement that the Parliament of Ontario intend to adopt the provisions of the plan contained in the Whitley report. This is generally known as the Whitley plan.

Among the Whitley plan's principles and its more specific objectives are the consideration of the following matters:

The provision of machinery for the regular consideration of wages and working conditions of the industries concerned by the council.

Measures for regularizing the wages and employment.

The settlement of differences between different parties and firms in the services, and the establishment of machinery for the purpose, where it does not already exist, with the object of securing the speedy settlement of disputes.

The collection of statistics of information as and when agreed matters appertaining to the industry.

The encouragement of the study of processes and design and of research, with a view of perfecting the output.

The provision of facilities for utilization of inventions and improvements in machinery or method, and for the adequate safeguarding of the rights of the designers of such improvements to secure that such improvements in method or invention shall go to each party an equitable share of the benefits financially or otherwise arising therefrom.

Spartacans Declares Bolshevism a Bugabo

Being Used to Scare the Peace Makers.

BELIEVE REACTIONARIES PLAN RESTORATION.

BERLIN, March 29, (By Frank Taylor)—Radical leaders declared today that the bugaboo of bolshevism is a trick by which Foreign Minister Brockdorff-Rantzau and Count Bernstorff hope to score a diplomatic victory in spite of military defeat. According to the radicals, the threat to return the peace terms and throw Germany into bolshevism, which is being talked broadcast in Berlin, especially with hearing of members of the allied mission, is an effort to impress the peace conference with the seriousness of the situation here.

It is charged that the German foreign office hopes this may lead to a split between the allied nations regarding the procedure if the German delegates refuse to sign the pact. Certain contentions, will, it is claimed, oppose continuing the blockade of Germany fearing the spread of bolshevism, while others will probably insist on inflexible conditions demanded by the Germans. The most sincere opponents of bolshevism, as well as the independent socialists, demand that a group of realists be sent to Paris in place of the commission already announced to deal openly with the allies in an effort to establish Germany's future relation with the world honestly and without tricks.

A supposedly secret organization of officers and soldiers of the old regime is being watched apprehensively by the radical elements, who claim it is the beginning of the reactionary movement. The participation of General Ludendorff in recent street demonstrations, during which he was loudly cheered by the crowds, worries the pacifists, who also are concerned at the rapid enlistment in the new military units, under old leaders.

Officers assure the correspondent these are merely efforts to prepare for the struggle with bolshevism. The militarists claim their new organization is not political, though they admit they will demand that the Government swing toward reaction, in case there is another uprising of the radicals. Laborites in the Rhineland are now threatening to demand a 25 per cent. wage increase, and a six-hour day. Spartacans are seizing the opportunity to prepare for a general political strike, which they declare will result in communication of Essen, Dusseldorf and other industrial centers.

GERMANY MAY SUSPEND ARMISTICE

BERLIN, March 29.—The Lokal Anzeiger publishes a statement that it understands that a suspension of the armistice with the entente allies is possible.
